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RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth, in joint session assembled, that the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The State may contract debts, to supply the public necessities, or to borrow money, or to otherwise provide, for the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the General Assembly, at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts shall be applied to the purpose for which it was contracted, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 2. Except the debts herein specified, in section one and two of this Article, no debt, whatever shall be created by or on behalf of the State.

SECTION 3. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as aforesaid, the Legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the interest on the State debt, or works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, or of the income or proceeds of sales of stocks owned by the State, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law, and sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assessing to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, insurrection or rebellion, or any other emergency, or in case of a public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

SECTION 4. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not be given in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned, to any individual, company or corporation, or to any stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

SECTION 5. The Commonwealth shall not assume the debt of any part of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the State to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the State in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness.

SECTION 6. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a party to any company, association, or corporation, or to obtain money for or loan its credit to any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECTION 7. There shall be an additional article to said Constitution, to be designated as ARTICLE XIII, as follows:

ARTICLE XIII. OF NEW COUNTIES. No county shall be divided, and no cutting off over one-tenth of its population (either to form a new county or otherwise), without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles.

SECTION 1. From section two of the first article of the constitution, strike out the words "of the city of Philadelphia, and of each county respectively"; from section five, same article, strike out the words "of Philadelphia and of each county"; from section seven, same article, strike out the words "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any"; and insert in lieu thereof the words "and no"; and strike out section four, same article, and insert in lieu thereof the following:

SECTION 4. In the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred shall be appointed and distributed equally throughout the State, by districts to be drawn by the General Assembly, to be divided into the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxable males may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three counties shall be entitled to a separate representation in any part of a district. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxable males to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, and each district shall elect one representative.

SECTION 5. At the first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner and on the basis hereinafter provided; but no ward shall be divided in the formation thereof.
