PHILADELPHIA MARKETS.

Monday Evening, August 4.

The Flour market remains inactive, and the stock and receipts are light; but the demand is limited, and only some 400a500 bbls found buyers, at 7,25 for standard Superfine made from new wheat, and 5 50 for scraped -the-latter inte inspected: standard brands of the latter description are held at \$6 50 per bbl, without sales to any extent, the transactions being confined to small lots for home consumption, at from \$6 50 to \$7 50 and \$8 per bbl., as in quality—the latter for fancy family flour. Corn Meal and Rye Flour are scarce; the last sales of the former were at \$3 for Pennsylvania meal; Brandywine is wanted at an advance on previous quotations; of the latter we hear of no sales:

There was a fair demand for prime new red wheat to day, at previous, quotations, and some 7000,8000 bus, mostly southern, were disposed of at 160a165c, in store and affont : about 5000 bus new Southern white also sold at 160a165c for ordinary, 170a172c for, fair and good, and 1200 bus choice old Kentucky at 175. Rye continues in request at rather better prices, and some 1100a1200 bus were sold at 70c for inferior Penna, and 78c for prime new Southern. Corn continues coarce and in request, with sales of 1800 bus Penna and southern yellow at 70a72c, as in quality. Oats are in stendy demand, and 5000a6000 bus bave been sold at 41a42c for old Southern and 42c for Penna.


