DESOLUTION PROPOSING A MENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonnealth of Ponnsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are reposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth-in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as Article XII.

Section 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenies, or to meet axpenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Secrion 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repel invasion, sup-

Scorrow 2. In addition to the above innied power the State may contract dobts to repel invasion, sup-press insurfection, defend the State in war, or to re-doom the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other

Section 3.-Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this Article, no debt. whatever shall be created by or on behalf of the State.

Section 4.-Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this Article, no debt. whatever shall be created by or on behalf of the State.

Section 4.-To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as aforesaid, the Legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amoundment, create a sinking fund; which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred apd fifty thousand deliars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the sane, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sales of stocks owned by the State, together with other fands, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and upless in case of war, insurrection or invasion, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied throwise than in the extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sun of five millions, of deliars.

Section 5. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or found to, any individual, company corporation, or association; or experition.

SEC. Of The commonwealth, shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repet-invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness:

SEC. 7. The Legislature-shall-not authorize any county, city, berough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution or party.
