A NEW CENT. - Everybody will be glad to learn that a new cent is to be coined, says the Philadelphia . Sun, The old copper head, which has so long represented the smallest fractional division of our decimal money in use, is too combrous and large for the little value it represents, and the substitution for it of a new coin, readily distinguishable from all others in virculation, will be considered by all a great improvement. It is therefore pro posed, by the Director of the Mint, that the new cent shall be eighty-eight parts copper, and twelve parts nickle. This will make a coin of a dark reddish color. It is to weigh 72 grains, less than half the present cent, which is 168 grains.




