DESOLUTION PROPOSING A-MENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonnealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments are roposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth articles

There shall be an additional article to said Constitu-

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as ARTICLE XII.

SECTION I. The State may contract debts, to supply casual dedicts or failures in revenues, or to meet oupeness not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the donoral Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the oreation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repel invesion, sup-

the State may contract debts to repel invesion, sup-press insurrection, defend the State in war, or to re-deem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other nurrous whatever.

SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this Article, no debt whatever shall be created by or on behalf of the State.

SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as aforesaid, the Legislature shall, at its first session after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to roduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the netannual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sales of stocks owned, by the State, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund unity be increased, from time to time, by sasigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, insurrection or invasion, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in the extingulatement—of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Secrico. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company corporation, or associative; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

Sec. 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, berough or township; or of any corporation or association unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repoi invasion, suppress domestic insur-rection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present

identodness. county, city, borough, township, or incorporated dis-trict, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any counany, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or lean its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

ARTICLE XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line outling of over one tenth of its population (either to form a new county or otherwise), without the *express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred agarer miles.
