RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as ARTICLE XXI. SECTION 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for.

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State.

SECTION 3. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the Commonwealth heretofore become a joint owner or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

SECTION 4. The Commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted by and on behalf of the State.

SECTION 5. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, or township, or incorporated district, by a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, or partnership.

SECTION 6. The Commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted by and on behalf of the State.

SECTION 7. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, or township, or incorporated district, by a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, or partnership.
