The Flour market has been very quiet today. There is some inquiry for straight brands which are scarce. A sale of 500 bbls. stan--dard saperfine, made from new wheat, is reported at a87, and 1000-blds. at -\$7 per bbl for home consumption prices range at from \$7 to \$7,50 and \$850 per bbl. for common to choice brands and extra. Rye Flour and Corn Ment are unchanged and without any ransactions to notice. -

Grain-There is not much Wheat-offering. but the demand has tallen off and prices favor the buyer. Some 8000 a 4000 bushels only were disposed of at 152 a 154c, for good Southeru and Penn'a: reds, mostly at the former rate, affont. White is dull at 162 a 164c .-Rye continues in request and scarce at 75c .--Corn is steady and in fair demand, and all offered taken, some 7000 a 8000 bushels, mostly Southern yellow, were disposed of at 67c Outs are about stationary with further sales of 3 a 4000 bushels at 37c. for new Southern, chiefly at the former rate, and 40c. for prime old Western.

ESOLUTION PROPOSING A-1 MENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF

Resolved by the Senate and Houss of Representative of the Commonnealth of Pennsylvania. In General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

Assembly must. That the individing animalments in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

Frest Amendment.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as Astroick All.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits of failures in revenues, or to meet or penses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct or conditions, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the idential Assembly, or at dilibrary periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the moment of the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted; and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repul invasion; suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this Article, no debt whatever shall be created by for no behalf of the State.

Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt, contracted as aforesaft, the Logislature shall, at its first, ession, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dellars; which sinking fund shall consist of the rict annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sales of stocks owned by the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, insurrection or invasion, no part

Sec. 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the sec. o. The commonwealth state not assume one debt, or any part thereof, of any country, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repol invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present-indubtaduess.

The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens; or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association; or couporation; or to obtain money for, or lean its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECOND AMEXIMENTS.

There shall be an additional article to said constitutution, to be designated as article XII., as follows:

ARTICLE XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one tenth of its population (either to form a new county or otherwise), without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles.

THIRD AMENDHENT.

From section two of the first article of the constitution, trike out the words of the city of Philadelphia and of each county respectively;" from section two same article, strike out the words, "of the city of Philadelphia and of the soveral counties;" from section soven, same article, strike out the words, "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any," and insert in lieu thereof the words "and no;" and strike out section four, same article, and in lieu thereof inse t the following:

"Sec. 4. In the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportione and distributed equally throughout the state, by districts, in proportion to the number of taxalle inhabitants in the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than, three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the formation of a district. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal taxable population as near as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representatives, "the edity of Philadelphia shall be divided into the ond of section seven; same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided in taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the formation thereof."

The legislature; at its first session, after the adoption of this amondment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into sonatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT. To be section XXVI, article I.

The logislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or count, any charter of incorporation hereafter con-beneith of under any special or general law, when-ter or their opint in it may be injudious to the citizens in the minumenth; in such manner, however, that is justice shall be done to the sorporators.




