PIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said Constitu

There shall be an additional article to said Constitu-tion to be designated as ARTICLE XII.

OF PUBLIC DERTS.

SECTION I. The State may contract debts, to supply casual doublets or fallures in revenues, or to meet ex-penses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such dobts direct or contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more Acts of the Concrai-Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never-exceed seven handred and lifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the greation of such debts.

exceed-seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Secrion 2. 
