ABOUT YOUNG MEN.

Fremont is charged with the henious offence of being a young man by his political opponents. It is true he is not so old as to be childish, nor yet so far advanced in years as to entitle him to the sobriquet of "a galvanszed old fogy." Mr. Fremont is 43 years of age-just in the prime of physical and intellectual vigor. On what authority, we would like to know, is he pronounced too young? The constitution of the United States fixes the age at which a man is eligible to Presidential honors and responsibilities, and Mr Fremont has passed that age eight years since. For evidence of this consult the record of his birth: and for evidence of his intellectual vigor and activity consult his writings-the record of his scientific explorations In view of this charge of youth against Fremont, we have taken the trouble to ascertain the ages of some of the men of mark in the world.

In June, 1775, when the colonies of North America had determined on resistance to British oppression, they looked anxiously about for some one to take command of their forces. The choice finally fell upon a youth of 48, whose name was George Washington: After a struggle of a year, under the most averse circumstances, the colonies decided to secode from the mother country, and for this purpose a "Declaration" must be made which would electrify the world, and tell Great Britain in unmistakable terms that they were determined to be free. A youth of 83, Thos. Jefferson, wrote that glorious document, and it stands unrivated in the English language Forty-one of the fifty six signers of the Declaration were youths under 50 years of age. When Jefferson was 42 he represented our republic at the French Court, and lour years later be was appointed Secretary of State.

When by the assistance of these youths' the colonies were successful in the war of Independence they concluded to frame a Constitution. Ilere, as before, a youth-came-to-their relief. James Madison, a youth of 36, "more than any other one assisted to form our Constitution. Among the most active in advocating the adoption of the Constitution was a youth of 31, an aid de camp and confident of Gen Washington, the author of many of those admirable essays on the Constitution, in the "Federalist:"-We allude to Alexander Humilton One year afterwards he was appointed Secretary of the Treasury, and at the youthful age of 32, he succeeded-Washington as Commander-in-Chief of the Army.

The great exponent of Democracy, John C. Calhoun, was but 35 years of age when be was appointed Secretary of War under Monroe, and 43 when he was elected Vice President with Jackson in 1828.

John Q. Adams was but 42 when he was sent as Minister to Russia; and Gen Jackson won the battle of New Orleans at the youthful

Lafayette was but 20 when Re arrived in this country to assist in our revolvtionary War, yet his opinions are quoted in certain quarters as if they were the opinions of a Sol

omon. Wm. Pitt was made Prime Minister of England at the age of 21, and for 17 years, during the stormiest period of English history he was so successful in the conduct of affairs that he received the title of "the pilot that weathered the storm." John Hampden was but 49 when he died, yet he made the British tremble in his lifetime by the power of his liberal ideas. But we need not multiply illustrations.

ADVENTURE IN CALIFORNIA.

who heard it from the lips of one of the party: "A party of three men started from Sacra mento on a prospecting tour, and being well supplied with provisions, they penetrated much farther into the mountains than any other party, without meeting with any success. Being men of great perseverance, however, they determined to pursue their course still farther, although they had nearly reached a a point where it was believed the foot of a white man never trod before. The party began to feel somewhat discouraged, as luck appenred to have abandoned them. They were many miles from any habitation, and their provisions were getting very low. A melancholy feeling prevaded the whole three, but they kept on till they come to a deep guloh.-After making a thorough examination, they returned to Sacramento for ropes and provisions. Having procured these, and loaded their mules with as much as was thought necessary for their purpose, they proceeded again to the gulch. To get down this ravine was the next object. They tied a rope to a tree, and by this means one after the other descended to the bottom, after lowering down the provisions and tools. Here they found gold in abundance, and labored assiduously to secure their pile as soon as possible, not being particularly in love with their habitation. By a more

accident, after having been in the ravine for several weeks, they discovered that the rope had been cut by the Indians, or let loose by some other means, which cut off all hopes of escape. The ledges of rock were perpendicular for hundreds of feet, and climbing up was out of the question.

Their provisions rapidly diminished, and starvation stared them in the face. The gold which they had secured was of no use. They had made up their mind that their end was near. Providentially, a party of friendly Indians came by, and hearing the hallooing, they discovered their whereabouts, and immediately went to work to release them. Ropes were obtained and let down, when they were drawn up one by one, and their gold alsobeing released from their gold also. Being released from their prison, they liberally rewarded the Indians, and went on their way to a more suitable location, thankful for their preservation from the awful fate with which they had been threatened .- N. 
