ABOUT YOUNG MEN.

Lafayette was but 20 when he arrived in this country to assist in our revolutionary war, yet his opinions are quoted in certain quarters as if they were the opinions of a Solomon.

Wm. Pitt was made Prime Minister of England at the age of 21, and for 17 years, during the stormiest period of English history he was so successful in the conduct of affairs that he received the title of "the pilot that weathered the storm."

accident, after having been in the ravine for several weeks, they discovered that the rope had been cut by the Indians, or let loose by some other means, which cut off all hopes of escape.

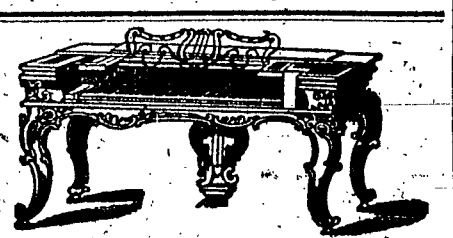
