By the recent cowardly attack and terrible outrage upon the person and the property of one of our most peaceable and worthy citizons by an armed mob of U. S. soldiers from the Carlisle Barracks, we are forced to s. solders now the carrists barracks, we are forced to the unpleasant necessity of demanding fedress for repeated injuries, and asking protection against the recurrence of like scenes of violencs. Compitants, we understand, have been made that outrages had been committed, and even of almost daily occurrence, upon the properties of our citizens near the Garrison, with-out producing the change which might have reasonably been expected. been expected.

Mr. McDowell, in the prime of life, in the enjoyment

Mr. McDowell, in the prime of life, in the enjoyment of health, in the possession of property, has been murderously assaulted—his skull broken in, his life endangered, his property violated, by an armed land of assassins, twenty-five soldiers of the United States, having an appointed leader, and with the avowed purpose of destroying and plundering property and taking life. Is there no remedy? Is there no redress? Is there no protection?

Soldiers have been tolerated in their lawless conduct.

Soldiers have been tolerated in their lawless conduct until a crime has been committed in our midst, so rightful in its consequences, as to call together a public meeting of the citizens of this community to take proper measures for the protection of their lives and proporty against the depredations of lawless and unrestrained soldiers.

This much is due to a worthy citizen, who has been the victim of a cruel, unprovoked and inexcusable outrage; it is due to his family and friends; it is due to ourselves as citizens of the same community. A fearful responsibility rests somewhere. It is the soletim conviction of this meeting that, if these outrages cannot be prevented, it is our duty and our right as citizens to dehand such strongest and restrictive measures as will afford relief. 
