TO JUDGE OF A HORSE .- In purchas ing a horse, sight, wind, feet and limbs must be the uppermost objects of inqui-ry; for nine horses out of ten are defeotive in one of these particulars. First then examine his eyes, and do this be-"fore he comes out of the stable ; see that they are clear and transparent; and that the pupils or apples of the eye are exactly alike in size as well as color. Next examine his pipes; if good and sound on being nipped in the guillet, he will utter a sound like that from a pair of bellows; but if his lungs are touched and he is broken winded, he will give . vent to a dry, husky, short-cough ;--look to his limbs; in passing your hand down his --legs, if you find any unnatural protuberance, or puffiness, or it in feeling firstone leg and then the other, you discover any difference between them, disease, more or less, is present : he may not be lame, but he is not clean upon his legs. If he is broad and full between the eyes, he may be depended on as a horse of good sense, and capable of being trained to almost anything. If you want a gentle horse, get one with more or less white about him; many suppose that the parti colored horses belonging to circusses, shows, &c., are selected for their odity, but it is on account of their 'docility and gentleness : in fact the more kindly you treat horses, the better you will be treated in return.

PLANTING' FRUIT TREES. -As the season for transplanting trees, is approaching, we have a word to offer as the best time for doing this work : we allude to spring and fall. It is well known that there are various opinions on this subject, and many are induced to wait six months from reading the views of some writer, when in fact ho'd better have planted his trees. If now it being autumn you are

ready, and your soil is dry, send at once. your order to your nurseryman, and don't . delay-the fall is the " best time" for you. If it is spring and you are ready to plant, don't wait till fall on any so count the spring is then, the best time for you. This delaying a matter so needful to be done so planting fuit trees, and dilly dallying along from one year to another is not the part of wisdom, and will never bring to our palates the delicious products of the vine and the tree. -Don't stop now to consult anybody, but off with the order. Get your ground well prepared by two or three plowings. If you don't wish to plow the whole ground. plow strips eight feet wide where you want your trees; this will reduce the labor of setting out amazingly. Finish by piling a bank of earth a foot high around each tree, packing firmly.
