

Farmers the Greatest Pedestrians in the Country

The farmer is, says the St. Louis Re publican, undoubtedly the greatest walk ing citizen in the republic. our readers may be skeptical about this. But let any one of them follow the track of a cutfivator of one hundred acres of corn dnring the coming summer, and he wil , travel a distance that, measured with surveyor,s chain would scarcely fall-short of five thousand miles. There is, in fact, before the farmer who determines on planting one hundred acres of corn a journey of more than four thousand miles Every farmer who cultivates a thirty acre field journeys twelve or thirteen-hundred miles. There are more than two miles of rows in an acre planted four feet apart. (In an acre, four rods wide by forty long, there are sixteen and a half rows, each one eighth of a mile long.) Reckoning four furrows to each row there are eight miles of plowing in break ing up an acre. It takes two miles of plowing to lay off one way and two miles the other, two miles walking to drop, and two miles hoeing or plowing to cover, or eight miles travel to lay off, and plant an acre. Then there are four miles of plowing in cultivating the first time, goingone round each row; four miles the second, six the third, where the middle-is broken out, and six the fourth, or twenty miles plowing in cultivating one acre Sometimes the corn is plowed less than this; often it is plowed more. So far we have thirty six miles of travel in the breaking up planting and cultivating one acre. And to this six miles or more of walk in cutting and shocking, with replanting, thinning out, &c., and there. are nearly fifty miles walking in every acre cultivated, or four or five thousand in one hundred acres, as above stated what thousands and millions of miles are traveled on foot every season by our farmers!. Such foot journeys, of so many miles, across the continent would be chronicled as among the noticeable pedestrian feats of the times. The farmer is, in fact, the great pedestrian of the age, and he goes plow in hand. We have how ever, noticed only his walking along the rows and furrows If to it we add the walks of the farmer to and from his field his walks about his grounds we should swell the length of his annual journey much beyond the figures we have indicated, as measuring the actual distances he travels every year.

The spirit of American invention has been busily at work taxing its ingenuity to provide some means of abridging the uniber of the steps taken every year by our farmers in cultivating their crops of, corn. The corn planter, in some shape accomplishes this, and has relieved the agriculturist of hundreds of miles of journeying. The secretary of an agri oultural society reports that he planted last season one hundred and fifty of corn, and saved nine hundred miles of walking by laying off his field with a four row maker, and covering with a two row corn planter. Had he marked off with a plow, (all the rows one way, and half the rows the other,) he would still have saved six hundred miles in the one hundred and fifty acres, or four miles per acre And this can always be done in the most rough and stumpy fields. The corn was in all respects a way as by the old hand hoe and plow

Then I seek for the barren spot within my breast, and for the weed which dwells within me. The one must be destroyed, and the other must be cultivated, in order that fruit may grow and thrive. Sometimes also I look upon my troubles as upon a storm which approaches, all black and threatening, but trings rain and cools the air, and I think "when it is over the sun will shine again." Se thus do I look upon myself and my life as a cultivated land. But ought the land to say to the husbandman, what doest thou?". Then said the other, "Thou speakest to mo of the fruit, instead of the root. Tell me how didst thou get such a mind of such thoughts?" And Gotthold answered and said' "Can spiritual gifts come from elsewhere than from him who sends the rain and the sunshine upon our fields, and brings forth bread from the earth? Behold! we are his husbandry."




