

THE CROPS FOR 1857 - A journey of some three thousand miles, within the three weeks past, in New York, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Jorsy; Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri and Idwa—fourteen States in all—enables us to give our readers the grateful assuranoe that the crops of the present year, according to the present promise, will be unsurpassed. The hay crop is already secure, and there is hardly a more important crop than this, or one of which many portions of the country have stood

in more need during some months past.
Immense quantities of wheat and corn have been sowed in the Great West, and if some and even much of the Winter wheat has been killed, the deliciency has been many times made up in the abungance of extra land planted. The season has been everywhere a very backward one, and even more backward in the far West than in the East. In the western part of Massachusetts and New-York, considering the differences of latitude, the crops are more advanced than in almost any other portions of the country. In Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, the fields look as if there could be no failure or famine, neither want nor suffering. The searcity of the present, arising from two causes of speculation and emigration West, and which has made a city like St. Louis a place to export from even Westward, is an event jent rely novel in its kind, and which can hardly occur again. The thousands who have gong West from New England, the Middle Etates, and the South, have had to be supplied from sources entirely new, and produce, therefore, is about as dear at Cincinuati, Chicago, and St. Louis, as at Boston and New York. The year of 1857 promises, we are happy to say, to be a year of abundance. Farmers will command good and even high prices, but not the exorbitant rates of the present time. No greater blessing can befall the t nation than good crops, and we ought to pray devoutedly for such a consummation.

DO THE PROFITS OF AGRICULTURE VARY MUCH IN DIFFERENT YEARS .-Sometimes they do, but generally not in

the long run.
When they do vary.—1. When the farmer devotes nearly all his strength to the growth of one staple, if that fails him he is a losser, and his profits that year, are cut off. If a farmer raises, wheat alone, or fruit alone, it is evident that in bad seasons, his support is taken away, or nearly so. 2. The same result follows, in the same circumstances, when, though the crop itself, is not cut off, its price is auddenly and greatly lowe ed by the failure of the demand, or by some other

But in general, the profits of farming are about equal, one year with another, for a very long term of years, because, 1 I a y scason is un avorable to any particular crop, the same sta on is common-ly favorable to some other crop which may supply its place. A cool wet spring is unfavorable to corn, but it is good for grass. . 2. If all crops should be very poor, the aggregate, though small, would command as high a price as a generous orop could. 3. In every case where the profits of farming vary most, namely, instances first mentioned above, the profits one year would compensate for the losses of another, so that a very fair average they lave every two or three years.

Inference.—1. The good farmer, who cultivates a variety of crops, need feel very little anxiety about the seasons; what he loses on one hand, he gains on the other. 2. It is in general best to have a variety, if one can; it favors independence, and equalises one year with another, - Ohio Farmer.

GRATE SALE OF STOCK .- The annual sale of blooded stock by R. A. Alexander, Esq., took place at his farm in Woodford county, Kx., on Wednesday, June 3d. This sale brought together a larger collection of people than any previous -sale of that distinguished breeder, the crowd in attendance being estimated at from a thousand to fifteen hundred persons. We annex a summary of the sales, merely adding that there were bidders present from nearly all the Western and from several of the Southeren States, to which much of the stock is destined:

30 Bulls sold for \$9,790, averaging per head \$326,33; 30 Heifers sold for \$6,490, averaging perchead \$216,33;—making 60 head of Cattle that sold for \$16,280, an average of \$271, 33. 3 Bucks sold for \$226, nveraging \$75,38-; 4 Cotswold Ewes sold for \$103' averaging \$25 75; 8 Pigs sold for \$70, averaging \$8 75. Amount of sales \$16,679. 2 Bulls let one year \$880, averaging per head \$415. Total amount of sales and lettings \$17, 599. Bull named Oliver sold for \$725, to R. A. Humphreys, Virginia

Dipping in oll is also recommended, and packing in Indianmeal Lay them with the small end down and if undisturbed they will be asgood at the end of the year as when packed Our plan is to keep them in the oil inal package and have them shelled out as wanted. They always keep satisfactory in this way, until they reach the table, when they are soon boiled.




