RESOLUTION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

PESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pena sylvania in General Assembly met: That the following amendments are proprised to the Constitution of the Continuous wealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article eleven, as follows:

ON PUBLIC PEBES. BECTION I. The state may contract dobts, to supply casual deficits or fallures in revenues or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted, by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and lifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to ropay the debts so contracted, and to no other putpose whatever

Secron 2. In addition to the above limited power, the state may contract debts to ropel invision, suppress insurrection, defoud the state in var, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state, but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it, was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever. Sixtion 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no doth whatever shall be ceated by, or on behalf of the state.

Bectron 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesald, the legislature shall. In tits lifts tossion, after the adoption of this emendment, create a shiking fund, which shall be aufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a run not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dolars; which sinking fund shall consist of the ust annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and or the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be dest, match by law. Thes, si sinking fund may, be increased, from time to time, by saligning to it any part of the taxes, or other rovenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war invasion in surrection, no part of the sali sinking fund halb to used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of the millions of dollars.


