BIRDS THEIR UTILITY. -We do not always know our best friends. But experionce sometimes teaches us, working out for us conclusions very unlike those we had previously entertained. In the history of birds, similar examples are not wanting. A writer of note says, 'After some States had pai threepence a dozen for the destruction of blackbirds, the consequence was a total loss, in the year 1749, of all the grass and grain, by means of insects, which had flourished under the protection of that law. Another ornith ologist, Wilson computes that each red winged black-bird devours, on an average fifty grubs daily during the summe Attaon. Most birds live entirely on worms and insects, and though some are destructive to our cherries and other fruits the number of such are small, and these propensities are to be offset by numerous and valuable services which no other

egencies can perform.

The following descriptions may throw light upon the treatment these birds have a right to claim at our hands.

The Baltimore Oricel, a beautiful and well known bird, called sometimes Goldrobin, Hang-bird, etc. It feeds chiefly on insects, and its services, are of great value They visit our gardens for grubs enly, and thus protect our pea vines and other plants from a destructive enemy.
The Red-winged Blackbird, often arri

wes at the North ere the snow has disappeared. It feeds on grubs, worms and eaterpillars, without inflicting any injury upon the farmer. Hence it does him s very important service.

The cow Blackbird is less numerous

than the species just described. They follow our cattle, and catch and devou the insects that molest them From this fact they derive their name.

The Rice-Bunting or Bob-o-link, in constantly employed in catching grass-hoppers, spiders, crickets, etc., and thus does good service. It is, however, said to do some injury to grain, especially at the South, and particulary when they eollect their young in flocks preparatory
to a flight towards their winter quarters.

The Crow Blackbird is one of our early visitors. While it devours immense numbers of grubs, etc., it is, also clearly proved that it pulls up the corn. South ern farmers attempt to diminish the amount of depredation, by soaking their corn in Glauber, salts, making it unpal-

atable to the birds.

The American Crow devours every thing estable, without much apparent choice, whether fruits, seeds, vegetables, reptiles, insects, dead animals, &c.

The Cedar bird gathers caterpillars, worms, etc., which it devours with an insatiable appetite. Our cherries and other fruits are not spared, but are devoured, in their season, as rapidly as are the canker worms and other enemies of the trees, in their season. But whatexer injury they may thus inflict seems irremediable as their numbers can scarce ly be diminished by any agency in our

The King-bird lives wholy on insects and worm, without any mischievousness, unless it be occasionaly to devour honeybees. That he has a taste for such food In pretty well established, though some Meny it. They attack the drones, only

The Cat bird is constantly employed in devouring wasps, worms, etc., but does not always spare our fruits. They devour of the latter, however, much less than would the insects they testroy.

The Wood-thrush lives on worms, beecles, etc., and never commits depredations of any kind. Their residence is much more constant in the extreme South than farther north. The Blue bird confines himself to the

destruction of beetles, spiders, grubs, wireworms, etc., and though they attack the sumae and wild cherry, and other wild berries, they do no injury to the fruits or vegetables of the garden. The Golden winged Wordvecker is re

puted a fruit-stealer, but "with all its faults", it is of great use to the hortisulturist.

The Red-hended Woodpecker, like the former, helps itself to fruit of all kinds, camies off apples even in its bill; but this useful laborer is also worthy of its bire; it does much more good than evil. The Downy Woodpecker, and perhaps some other species, come under the san sategory as those species, already describ-

was printed and that of the printer, together with the date of the year when it was executed, is a beautiful edition of the Psalms in atin. It was issued at Mentz, by Faust & Schoeffer, in 1457, just four hundred years ago. The most perfect copy known is that in the imperial library of Vienna. It is printed in folio or vellum and is a superb specinen of printing. A second edition of the work was issued in 1459, under the patronage of the St. Albans and Benedictine Monks, which contained, probably, the first printed text of the Anathanasian creed.

The earliest printed book, containing texts

The carliest printed book, containing texts und-engravings, is called the Histories of Joseph, Daniel, Judith and Esther, printed by Joseph Pfister, at Bamberg, in 1462.—It is amongst the rarest typographical curiosities in existence, there being only two known copies of it—one in the royal library at Paris, and another in the collection of Earl Segment. As early as 1443 he had printed with lines cut in wood, but this was only a small mechanical advance on what had been done for ma-

The first engraving on wood, of which there is any record in Europe, is that of the ancient. "Actions of Alexander," by the two Cunois, executed in the year 1285 or 1286. The engravings are eight in number, and the size about nine inches by six.

Stereotype printing was introduced into London, thy Wilson, in 1804.

The first newspaper printed in the New World was published in Boston, under date of September 25, 1690. A copy of this paper is preserved in the Colonial State Paper Office, London. It is about the size of a sheet of letter paper, and one of the pages is blank.—Boston Transcript.

### TABLE MANNERS.

We give our young readers an extract on this subject, taken from an excellent little work on etiquette, called "How to Behave," lately published by Fowler & Wells, of New York. The observations are of a general character and universal application, and the

character and universal application, and the subject is one which young persons cannot become acquainted with too soon:

"Take your seat quietly at the table. Sit firmly in your chair without lolling, leaving back, drumming, or any other uncouth action. Unfold your napkin and layit in your lap. Eat soup delicately with a spoon, holding a piece of bread in your left hand. Be careful to make no noise in chewing or swallowing your food. Cut your food with your knife, but the fork is to be used to convey it to your mouth. A spoon is employed for food that cannot be eaten with a fork. Take your fork or spoon in the right hand. Never use both hands to convey enything to your mouth. Break bread, not cut or bite it. Your cup was made to drink from and your saucer to hold the cup. It is not well to drink anything hot, but you can wait till your ten or come cools. Eggs should be your tea or cones cools. Eggs should be eaten from the shell, (chipping off a little of the larger end, with or without an egg-cup. The egg-cup is to hold the shell and not its contents. Bu attentive to the wants of any lady who may be seated next you, especially where there are no servants, and pass any thing that may be needful to others. When you send up your plate for anything, your knife and fork should go with it. When you have finished the course, lay your knife and fork on your plate, parallel to ends other, with the handles towards your right hand. with the handles towards your right hand.
Of course you should never put your knife
into the butter or the salt, or your shoon
into the sugar-bowl. Eat moderately and
slowly for your health's sake; but rapid,
gross, and immoderate eating is as vulgar as
it is unwholesome. Never say or do any
thing at table that is lidble to produce dis
gust. Wipe your nose, if needful, but never
blow it. If it is necessary to do this, or to
spit, leave the table. It is almost unneces
sary to mention that the tablecloth-is not the sary to mention that the tablecloth-is not the place to put your salt. Bread is the only comestible which the custom of well-bred people permits to be laid off your plate. It is well not to seem too much in haste to commence as if you were famishing, but neither is it necessary to wait till everybody is served before you commence. It is perfectly proper to 'take the last piece,' if you want it, always presuming that there is more, of the same in reserve.



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
