ESOLVED by the Senate and House sylvania in General Assembly mot. That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article cloven, as follows: ON PUBLIC PEBTS.

Secrion 1. The state may contract dobts, to supply casual deficits or failures in rovenues or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such dobts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such dobts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the dobts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or repay the dobts so contracted, and to m' other putpose windvers.
