From the Savannah News. A PRACTICAL TEST OF CHINESE SU-OAR-CANE.—Springfield, Ga., August 19, 1857.—Messrs. Editors: Amidst the heating and exciting political questions of the day, I have thought I would transmit to you the result of a practical experiment with the Chinese sugar-cano.

Last spring I purchased one dollar's worth of the seed, and planted it in rows about four feet apart, and in the drill one and two seed every six inches. My in tention was to make forage, having very little confidence in its saccharine qualities; but I was induced to change my purpose, and make an effort to procure syrup from it.

Myself and Captain P. H. Stanton selected ten canes, measuring one inch in diameter, and from eights to nine feet long, which yielded five quarts of juice; ten more of the same size, which had been cut one day and night, gave the same quantity; and again ten from his measureing 11 inches in diameter yielded six quarts, wanting a gill or half-pint. We cut all the cane for boiling, irrespective of size or age. We put two hundred gallons of juice in the boiler for the first boiling, and after boiling slowly for ten hours took out twenty gallons of very good syrup. The next day we carried 170 gallons through the same process, only increasing the fire, boiling it. in seven hours, and obtained six-teen gallons of superior syrup,.... This we boiled down a little more, which makes it thicker, and is also better flavored than the first. A third boiling of 136 gallons is at this mement taken off, grew on Captain Stanton's plantation, which is very fine, and which yields about the same proportion of syrnp, or from appearance

As the pot began to boil we put lime in each boiling, governed in quantity somewhat by the report of ex-Governor Hammond, of South Carolina:

My seed planted nearly half an acre. No pains had been taken to put the ground in a high state of cultivation, neither was it worked with an eye to a report for the public; and turning out thirty-six gallons of fine syrup, which ground and boiled in two days, pays bet-tor than anything I ever planted.

The principal reason for this hasty and imperfect sketch is I have heard of some one boiling and failing to make a good article, and who calls it a humbug. My impression is that they do not boil it sufficiently. If they make more than one gallon, out of nine or ten, the syrup will be inferior, unless the cane is far superior to what we ground. It should be boiled down until it has the appearance of the syrup from sugar cane when you desire to make sugar, and then you will have a fine article, if proper atention has been paid to the skimming off-thegreen soum which will arise to the top. BEES

The fall management of bees will claim our attention in this article. - Your close attention will be required, to prevent your weak stocks from being rob-bed. When we say "stocks," we refer to families, one year or more old. Swarms of the present year are not properly called stocks. Weak swarms are not so liable to be robbed as weak stocks, in consequence of the combs of their hives being generally better protected by the bees. All hives of weak stocks should, at this season of the year, be set down closely upon the floor boards, (some apiarians raise all their hives about half an inch in the spring, which is right,) and then the passage way should be contracted, so that at the same time; and if any signs of robbing occur, let them be contracted still smaller. If you find a hive being robded, and the case is a bad one, close up all entrances to it immediately, at the ne time running some thin wedges under it to admit air, but not thick the County, wholesale and retail.

enough to admit bees. Let it remain Music and Musical Instructions, for sale by SHRYOCK, TAYLOR & SMITH. you should open the entrance, and rap smartly upon the sides of the hive, to hasten out the marauders. When all have left, close the entrance again, and keep it closed the next day, when you may allow a small passage for the bees that belong to the hive, and they will protect themselves from further robberies, if the passage way is contracted sufficient-

Another important point in our north ern latitude, is to examine all stocks, and ascertain, if any are infected with diseased brood. If so, it is uscless to winter them, as they will in all cases dwindle away and die out the next season, without swarming .- Such families, if quite weak in numbers, may be dispersed among other, hives, on some pleasant day in October or November, to run their risk of being killed. Turn the hive bottom upwards and rap on its sides smartly a few minutes, to cause the bees to gather on one side, by becoming alarmed, and then proceed to cut out the combs, and with the feather end of a quill brush off the bees from the combs, as you take them out. Probably the most of the bees will be killed, as they attempt to enter other hives, but nothing better can be done with such families when very weak in numbers. On the contrary, if populous, they may be driven out, and joined with some weak stock or swarm, that is not diseased. This operation should be performed very late in the season, when the weather is too cold to allow them to leave their hives, but not cold enough to prevent their being joined. There will be some fighting, of course, but in many cases the majority of the family driven out have been saved, and have rendered he wintering of the family, to which they were joined safe, when had no such junction taken place, it would have perished. It is a good plan to sprinkle both families freely with a thin syrup of honey, in which a little essence of wintergreen, or other pleasant perfumery is mixed. The bees of both families will at once commence to clean, or gather off this sweetening, and in so doing all become blended in the same scent, and thereby lose their identity, as bees can only distinguish the members of other families by their smell each family having a peculiar smell or scent of its own.

To ascertain whether your bees are diseased or not, blow a little tobacco smoke among them, after turning over the hive. and then with a long knife out into the centre combs and ascertain the condition of the brood. The diseased brood look black, and have a fetid smell, being in a putrid state. If no such brood is found below the centre of the hive, when in its position, you may consider the family healthy.


