### PLOWING POINTED LANDS ...

Though it is customary to strike out lands for plowing, in the form of a par-allelogram, that is, both ends of the same yet it often happens that, owing to the irregularity of a field, one or more lands run out to a point. In such cases it is the universal practice to plow entirely around them, that is, drive the team to the pointed end and turn round upon the plowed and. Where there are many turnings of this kind there is necessarily much tramping of the loosened ground. In my practice, I avoid this as follows: When going out towards the point, at a place where the plowed land is still say six feet in width, I turn the team round on the unbroken ground and go back around the wide end. By turning about thus as often as I reach a place in the plowed land of only six feet wide I reduce the whole to a uniform width, and have done all the turning and tramping upon unplowed land. The last six leet is, of course, finished by furrows the whole length of it. It will readily be seen that the turnings are no more than if they were made at the same places as fast as the land is run out to a point. Besides avoiding packing the loosened soil, it is much easier for the team to turn upon solid ground, especially if the toil be mellow and deeply plowed.

A MAINE YANKEE. REMARKS.—The above is a valuable enggestion. Practical plowman will, of course, understand that it is necessary to narrow each furrow to a point before turning, and also to strike in on the opposite side with a narrow cut, otherwise the two sides of the six feet wide plot would be left very rough, or notched, and the first through furrows to finish off the last plot would be very uneven, and, at least, show bad. Every one does should delight in seeing his work left smooth and even .- American Agricul-

## LARD AND RESIN FOR TOOLS.

"A penny saved is two-pence carned." Not less than \$50,000 worth of valuable tools, belonging to the readers of the American Agriculturist, (less than \$2 each,) will be spoiled, or materially injured, simply by rusting between now and next Spring, The damage alone will be \$50,000. Look at the plows, harrows, cultivators, hoes, shovels, forks, chains, axes, saws, not to enumerate wagon irons, and a multitude of little tools that ought to be provided on or about any farm, and then reckon up how many of them will be left where the combined effect of air and moisture will attack their surfaces and cat away enough to render them rough at least, if not to materially depreciate their value. Many instruments are destroyed faster by lying idle than they would be by constant wear. We will not now write a homily upon \_the value and importance of a Tool-house and of having every implement stored in it, but give a recipe for an exceedingly simple, cheap and effective preparation, one available to all, which will at least eave all metals from loss by rust-

Take about three pounds of lard and one pound of resin. Melt them together in a basin or kettle and rub over all iron or steel surfaces in danger of being rus-ted. It can be put on with a brush or piece of cloth, and wherever it is applied it m st effectually keeps air and moisture away, and of course prevents rust. When knives and forks, or other household artic es, liable to become rusted or spotted are to be laid away, rub them over with this nexture, and they will come out bright and clean oven years afterwards. The coating may be so thin as not to be perceived, and it will still be effectual. Let every one keep a dish of this preparation on hand. As it does not spoil of itself it may be kept ready mixed for months or years. Mem. Fresh lard, containing no salt, should be used. Resin is a cheap article, and may be obtained almost anywhere for four to six cents per pound.

POINTS OF A GOOD WORKING ON -The head should be long and slender. The short-headed ox may start tolerably quick at the whip, but will soon forget it .-The eye should be sharp but p'easant .-The black-eyed ox is apt to run away.— For strength he should have a good bosom. For travelling the legs should be straight and the ankle smaller than the foot; the toes should be directly forward. If the animal toe out the knee will bend in, and the leg will be as much weaker than a staight one as a crooked stick is weaker than a straight one for bearing a weight placed on the top of it; with such a form—the inside claw is liable to be strained. Avoid the long, peaked hoof. Let the back be straight from head to hil-though from the hins backwards if be slope a little it is not much of a fault ; but don't let him rise in that part. For hardihood, the round built or round ribbed ox-one that is not in danger of knocking his hips off in going through the woods-is best. He should be trained to the yoke quite young. Three pairs early put to work, but not overworked, would do as much labor as four pairs that are not broken until they have nearly attained their sgrowth .- Chemung County Republican.

LOOK FOR THE BEE MOTH. -Those having bees and wishing to keep them and have "luck," must almost daily visit their hives, (early in the morning is the time,) and set them up on one side destroy the worms that secrete themsalvas under the edges of the hive. Unless this is carefully attended to, don't expect to be successful in keeping bees, for they are the great enemy of the bee.

CURE FOR POTATO ROT -In a recent agricultural meeting of the Massachumington, exhibited some seedlings which he had cultivated for six years, and kept them free from rot. His theory is that light and air tend to develop the disease, and if the potatoes are kept in the soil during the winter they will not rot. Of course they must be covered deep enough to prevent the frost from injuring them. This is precisely what Mr. Roberts of Michigan, proposed to "disclose" for a consideration in money, some four years ago, and has been familiar to the petato cultivator for at least half a century. As the frost last year penetrated in this latitude (Germantown) full three feet, and further north and east a foot more, it would be a pretty task to accomplish to get the potatoes out of reach of


