Death of Hon. Lewis McLane. The Hon. Louis McLane died on Wednesday, at his residence in Baltimore, in the seventy second year of his age. He was the son of ALLEN McLANE, a distinguished officer in the Revolutionary war, and was born in the village of Smyrna, Kent county, Delaware, on the 28th of May, 1784.

He served in this place until 1888, when he became Sec retary of State, and in June, 1834, he retired

from political life. In 1887, when the financial condition of the country required his services among ourselves, olitical life.
