Farm Life a School of True Manhood.

The men who have left their mark upon the ages in which they have livel; have done a great and noble work for the race; have been with few exceptions, men of moble physical moulds of the founda-tion of their greatness and of their fame was laid in the patient training of their physical powers. Such a man was Washington, and most of the worthies who were associated with him in the struggl for our liberties. Such was Clay and Webster, and many of their contemporaries in our national Senate. Their early days were spent upon the farm, and the thoughts of their declining years were given to the improvement and the cultivation, and the embellishment of their respective homesteads. Ashfield and Marshfield will long be seenes of pilgrimage to the husbandman as well as the patriot.

The whole tendency of farm life is to develope the body healthfully and symmetrically. The child is not pent up in the narrow back yard of a city dwelling, nor turned into thronged and filthy streets to pursue his sports. His eyes open first upon green fields and fragrant meadows, and his first footfall out of doors is upon the matted gress beneath the shadowy trees of his rural home. He drinks in health from every breeze, and all the scenes around him call forth that playfulness which performs so important an

office in our early training.

And this leads us to speak of the influence of farm life upon the home virtues. No occupation can be more favorable to the cultivation of those qualities which are the charm of the domestic circle. The farmer is much more at home than is possible with any other men. How many there are in our cities, who see their families at evening, or on the Sabbath: They live for their business, and this, from its location, takes them from home early and late. How many from this same cause, forsake housekeeping and huddle into boarding houses and hotels, where the charm and beauty of the family, as God instituted it, is entirely lost; and children fall under a thousand unfriendly influences that would never reach them at home! With the best arrangements wealth could command in the city, it is well nigh impossible to keep children under the influence of their parents; so that they shall have a distinct family character, and bear the moral, as they do the physical image of their progenitors. Parental influence is dissipated amid the varied social influences to which they are subjected from their earliest days. Then what perplexi-ties harrass the man of business in the city-his capital often invested in profitless enterprise, exposed to the depredations of honest men, betrayed, chented, and ruined by knaves and bankrupts. From the very character of his business,

cial credit depends upon this uncertain ty, and he is often compelled to full back upon nothing, a ruined man. Ninety-five failures in a hundred, among most business men in the city, tell a sad tale of the perplexity and sor row, the corroding cares and anguish of mercantile life. How can a father goaded with these anxieties, from the beginning to the end of the year, do justice to his children, even if his business allowed him to be with them a part of the time He is not in a frame of mind to superin tend their education and to perform a

Corn Cobs.—As ground corn cobs mixed with cut straw, fodder or hay make excellent food for your stock; don't sellyour corn on the ears, but shell it before you sell it. Those who may not have the convenience for grinding their corn cobs can render them good food for their cattle by having them chopped and cooked, either by the process of boiling or steaming. If the corn cobs be properly economized-cattle can be substituted upon much less long provender.

CORN STALKS .- Where these have been cut up, after the corn has become glaced, with the fodder on, if cut up with a proper machine, make an excellent provender for cattle; and when a half oushel of the stalks cut up are mixed with a peck of bran or a peck of cob meal they will make two feeds for a milch cow-two such feeds as will induce her to contribute generously to the milk pail.

MILCH COWS AND YOUNG CATTLE. These should all have the advantage of warm, well ventilated stables or dry sheds; be cleanly and comfortably kept; have full supplies of food, and receive at least twice a week, an ounce or two of 'salt or the same quantity of mixture comprised of equal parts of mild oyster shell lime, salt and sifted ashes. In addition they should have pure fresh water thrice a day.

FEEDING OF ROOTS.—Roots, when fed to milch cows and other cattle, should be out fine and mixed with cut hay or straw For milch cows and other cattle a peck of roots and a peck of out straw-or hay mixed together, sprinkled with salt, makes an enriching meal for each. Most roots are the better of being cooked; but potatoes should never be fed raw, as cooking them makes them much more nutritious and healthful.

Asnes Shve and keep all the ashes made on your place under cover. Five bushels of, ashes, composted, with sixty bushels of marsh, vivor or creek und, will convert the latter into good manure.


