Farmers' Department.

Hints for the Season.

As it is now approaching the time whon farmers will have their main work of the year finished, a few ideas, suggestive of the little extras he might do to add to his welfare, will not be out of place. A great many good farmers neg. ect one grand item in their preparation. for winter; that is, to provide good shellow their cattle, and sometimes even their horses, to yun in their fields or in the roads all winter, exposed to the driving winds, rain and sleet, and to all the inclemencies of winter; cause the death of some of them, and those that live till spring will take more feed to "bring them out" than they are worth. Now, any farmer, with a very little expense, can erect sheds that will protect and keep his stock warm and comfortable during the months that he has to feed them, and thereby save considerable fodder, for experience proves that stock of any kind, kept in this way will not need the quan tity of food that they would if exposed to. theweather; and this is plain, because those that are exposed need all their food to keep up their animal heat, while those that are slieltered can grow fat on the quantity that the others consume ; therefore, if farmers wish to profit themselves, and do a deed of humanity towards their

stock, they will protect them from the cold rains, snows and winds of win-Now is the time for those farmers who wish to have apples or potatoes for their own use next spring to bury them. Potatoes will keep from freezing a great deal better if they are buried than if they are put in a cellur, and apples will not rot as much. A very good way to bury either, is to select a good, dry spot near the house; shovel and scrape off the loose dirt on the surface, and then put on a layer of clean, dry straw or leaves, of a thickness to prevent the dampness of the ground injuring the potatoes; after this is done make the pile of potatoes or apples; of potatoes twenty or twenty-five bushels is chough, of apples ten or fif-teen bushels or less will do very well. They should be perfectly dry and buried on a sunny day. After the pile is made cover them over with the leaves or straw about ten or twelve inches deep all over; then put on dirt somewhat deeper than the ground generally' freezes, and then cover them over with a few clapboards to ward off the rain. A neighbor of mine sthat buried his apples this year says that out of twenty bushels of Pearmains he will not in the spring have a peck of rot-

ten ones. November is considered the best time in the year to prune fruit trees ; all the little shoots that come up at the root of the trees should be cut off, and all the dead and superfluous limbs should be also

cut off, for they will heal better if done now than if done in the spring. All the trees in an orchard should be thoroughly mulched ; it will not only protect the roots from the frosts of winter, but will make good manure for them next year. Now is also the time for all who wish

to have fruit to set out the trees. They will be further advanced in their growth a year hence than if set out next spring; besides they will be more apt to live. One year ago I planted twenty-five apple trees, and every one of them lived but two, and those two were dead when I got them from

the nursery. It is astonishing how many that count themselves good farmers will let their tools and implements of agriculture re-'main wherever they happen to be used last, exposed to the action of the weather, when they can just as well as not put them under shelter, where they can be found when they are wanted, and made to



Cure for Shying.

If a lady's horse be addicted to shying. I will give her a sure and simple method for the same; one that I have never known to fail. Let us, for instance, suppose the existence of a heap of stones on the near side of the road. The horse sees the indistinct grey object and prepares to shy at it. The moment he shows such symptoms, let the fair rider turn her eyes on the exact opposite side, i.e., the off side, and look steadily from the offending heap, and I'll engage the horse will walk quietly by. For many years I have ridden horses

of all tempers and dispositions, some of them much given to shying, and have never found this simple remedy to fail in its effects. Let those who scoff at me try The reason is this ; the 'human evehas doubtless, a great influence on all an imals, and there is a strong and secret influence between the horse and rider ; the horse sees the indistinct object, and looks doubtfully towards it : his rider becomes alarmed, immagining that the animal is going to commit, some eccentricity; the fear is communicated to the animal and he starts in terror from the object which ias frightened him ; whereas if he finds his rider sits unmoved and unconcernedly, he regains his confidence, and goes on, in the even tenor of his way.

I believe that one-half of our horses are ruined for life by being hit over the head for shying:

Trees in being transplanted, to do well, must be taken up with care, with all the roots possible. These should not be exposed to the sun, wind or frost -The ground in which they are to be plan-ted, should be deeply ploughed-large holes dug to receive the trees, which must not be planted quite as deep as they are in the nursery; as the ground will afterward settle. No grain crop should be cultiva-ted around them but root crops are most suitable, as the hoeing of them will aid in keeping the ground mellow, about the
