Heat disorganizes the flesh, deadens the cuticle or outer skin, admits air which is irritating. A good conting of flour shuts, out the air, soothes the irritation, and dries up the fluids thrown out. Do not imagine that something healing must be applied. Not all the salves in the world can amend broken flesh. You can stick together broken glass or wood with wax or glue. You can weld together seared iron, but no such application to flesh disorganized, cut or burned away -Nature, so to speak has a way of her own, and only one way to repair a breach in the flesh. The healing material comes from within. If the hand be cut, bring the severed parts together, hold them there steadily, cover up the part from the air and from ex ternal-injury, and the healing-will-go-on as long as there is no disturbance. . If from curiosity or anxiety, or other cause, you disturb the half-formed new flesh,

a sore will be the consequence. We repeat, for all kinds of burns or scalds, however severe, put on only a thick coat of flour. If a hard crusty mass be formed, so as to produce irritation, after a day or two wash off the surface carefully with blood warm water, dry partially, and put on more flour, but never disturb the actual surface of the sore until, when entirely healed the seab falls off of its, own accord. Our word. for it, this treatment will best promote the cure of burns .- American Agricul-

MONARCH OF THE ORCHARD .- Th Reading Press says that the largest apple tree in the United States is standing within the limits of the city of Reading, on the farm of Wm. B Schoener. It is called the 'President'-a name given to it many years ago by the venerable William Schoener, father of the present owner. The stock or trunk of the tree measures five feet and a half in diameter at a point a few feet above the ground; there is a protuberance or excrescence of bark, of great thickness, not included, however in the measurement. Its annual yield of apples was never less than sixty bush els. The apples in size were as large as the Fallenwalder. The tree is estimated to be over one hundred years old, and attained its present size fifty years ago. The upper branches are large massive columns. which would make ten ordinary apple trees, supporting, when in bloom, an arch of foliage of sixty-five feet in diameter and a circumference of over two

Apple-yellowish green ground, faint red cheeks, white flesh, sub acid, short thick stem, shape symmetrical, and all of regular size. Senson from November till April. The editor has frequently en-joyed the apple, and found it of superior quality. The tree fs evidently in its dotage, but ten years ago it was in prime bearing condition. The same kind of apple is not known to exist elsewhere. A large number of fine graftings from this tree are now growing in various parts of Reading.

MANURE.—We have frequently caution ed formers not to bury their manure too deep in the soil, as the tendency of their juices is downward-not upward. A writer on an exchange says: "I have found in all experiments that the nearer I kept the manure to the top of the ground, the more I got from it. I spread at the rate of thirty to forty loads of man-ure to the acre on the field, (on the grass:) I then put the plough in from ten to twelve inches deep-It was an old-fashioned plough and turned it over very flat and smooth. The rest of the piece I ploughed about eight inches deep. I treated the piece all alike, afer that, until I laid it down. I meant to put it where the ammonia would not escape. I watched the field for six or seven years, and I could not see any difference in the crops, where this extra man-ure was put, till I took up the piece again, and then I purposely put the plow down so as to bring up my lost manure to the light and heat, and it told the story for the next seven years where it

TO KEEP RABBITS FROM BARKING TREES .- The time is approaching when we must secure our young fruit trees against the incursions of rabbits, or have them killed or very much injured. I will give you the simple plan that I and some of my neighbors have pursued with complete success. I tear up old newspapers in strips fifteen or eighteen inches long, and wrap them around the body of the tree, commencing at the ground, and securing it with common twine. The paper will withstand all the rain that falls on it, and I never knew a tree injured by rabbits that was thus protected. Anoth er advantage of the plan is that it can be so quickly done—one person can tie up hundred trees in two hours.—B. A. RIVES .- Valley Farmer.




