The undersigned Committee appointed by the Court, to visit, examine into, and report upon the mode of management and present condition of the Poor House of this county, beg leave to state, that in discharge of the duties askigned them they have visited the institution at different times during the year. There were in the Poor House of the first day of January, 1857, 90, of which 12 were colored. There have been admitted since then 224, including 6 born in the house, making the whole number provided for during the year 314: including 22 out door pampers; of these 7 liars died, 2 hound out. 9 eloped, and 135 discharged, leaving the number in the house on the lat of January, 1558, including 22 out door pampers, 134. In addition to the above 775 translent pampers have been admitted and their wants supplied.

We are happy to say that in all instances well found everything in good order, all the appartments present a clean and, healthy appearance, their clothing is abundant, their diet-abundant and nutriflous, and all who are able receive the faithful attentions of the regular physician. Labor is provided for all who are able to work. The children have proper care and attention bestowed upon them, and when of sufficient years are put out to service with suitable persons. Upon the whole your committee are fully satisfied that the institution has been well managed for the year just clossed. 
