The Horse Charmer.

The following singular article is from the Indianna Farmer, and we shall be glad to know if the editors of that paper have not been imposed upon. A few years ago, during the session of the United States Agricultural Society, at Washington, we saw some feats performed by a horse-trainer. He used a small drum, kept continually beating, and the wildest and most unmanageable horse that could be found would follow him like a dog. He would go into the stalles without the least fear of being kicked, commencing to beat this drum before going near the horse, and then going through some manipulations about his head, which we supposed to be at the time mere pretences, but they may have been connected with the following receipt .- Many accounts have been given in English journals of what are called the 'Horse Whisperers,' that are to be found at English and Irish fairs, pretending to whisper in the ears of horses, after which the most untractable are readily managed by themselves and others,

The horse-castor is a wart or excresence which grows on every horse's fore legs, and generally on the hind legs. It has a pecular rank musty, smell, and easily pulled off. The ammonical effluvia of the horse seems peculiarly to concentrate in this part, and its very strong odor has a great attraction for all animals, especially canine, and the horse him-

For the oil of cumin, the horse has an instinctive passion-both are original natives of Arabia, and when the horse scents the odor, he is instinctively drawn toward

The oil of rhodium posesses peculiar proporties." All animals seem to cherish a fondness for it and it exercises a kind of subduing influence over them. The directions given for taming horses

are as follows: Procure some horse-castor, and grate it fine. - Also, get some oil of cumin, and keep the three seperate in air-tight bot

Rub a little oil of cumin upon you hand and approach the horse in the field, on the windward side, so that he can smell the cumin. The horse will let you come up to him then without any

Immediately rub your hand gently on the horse's nose, getting a little of the oil on it. You can then lead him anywhere you please. Give him a little of the castor on a piece of loaf sugar, apple, or po

Put eight droops of oil of rhodium into a lady's silver thimble. Take the thimble between the thumb and middle finger of your right hand, with the fore finger stopping the mouth of the thimble to prevent the oil from running out whilst horse.

As soon you have opened the horse's mouth, tip the thimble over upon his tongue, he is your servant. He will follow like a pet dog.

Ride fearless and promptly, with your

knees pressed to the side of the horse, and your toes-turned in and heels out then you will always be on the alert for a shy or sheer from the horse, and he can

never throw you.

Then if you want to teach him to lie down, and stand on his nigh or left side, have a couple of leather straps about six feet long; string up his left leg with one of them round his neck; strap the other end of it over his shoulders; hold it in your hand, and when you are ready, tell him to lie down, at the same time, gently, firmly, and steadily pulling on the strap, touching him lightly on the knee with a strap. The horse will immediately lie down. Do this a few times, and you

can make him lie down without the straps. He is now your pupil and your friend. You can teach him anything, only be kind to him-be gentle. Love him and he will love you. Feed him before you do yourself. Shelter him well, groom him yourself, keep him clean, and at night always give him a good bed, at least

a foot deep.

In the winter season, do not let your horse stand out a long time in the cold without shelter or covering; for remember that the horse is an aboriginal native of a warm climate, and in many respects his constitution is as tender as a

Ice-Houses .- An intelligent cotemporary remarks that this is the season of the year when all who wish to live comfortable, through the heat of summer put up their ice; and as there are but few ice-houses for storing that valuable com-modity in our city, we herewith publish a plan for the erection of such a building.

The building can be erected at but a trifling cost, and if properly filled, will contain enough ice to last a family through a whole summer. Besides the comforts which it will entail upon the lucky possessor, when 'Old Sol' showers down his fiercest rays, will amply repay him for the trifling outlay. We advise all our citizens who can, to crect such a building upon their farms, and promptly till them with good ice, and then they need not fear 'Old Sol's' hottest rays during the

co ning summer "Any person in the country, where timber is cheap, can exect an ico-house at but little expense. All that is required is to put a strong frame of the size of the house required, and board it up close, inside and outside, with a space between all round. This space is stuffed close with straw or dry saw-dust. The roof is made in the same manner, and the house is then complete. Straw and saw dust are cheap, and good non-conductors. The house should be situated on a dry spot, and should have a drain under the floor It should also be convenient, to be filled easily. The walls of stone and brick icehouses should be double, as well as those of wood. Great care should be exercised in packing ice-all the blocks should be clear and solid, and about the same thick ness, so that they may be packed close together, and frozen into a solid mass. In favorable situations, good ice-houses may be excavated like caves in the sides of hills."



In addition to the above 775 transient paupers have been admitted and their wants supplied.

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


