Though this month has been called the month of leisure for the farmer, there is much that he can do to save time and

labor in the Spring. Cattle should be well taken care Cut straw and fodder should be used freely, and if much coarse feed is issued, steaming apparatus will be found of ser-vice. Cows-about calving should have . extra food, and plenty of stable room at

night. Seed Corn is often found to lave been . defective after having been planted. If the seed has not been selected while the Corn was still upon the stalks, taking those which matured earliest, and upor stalks bearing more than one car, it should be attended to now, and samples should be sprouted in the house to ascertain whether its vegetating power has been

injured in any way.

Fences.—New ones should be built and old ones repaired, if the frost does not prevent .- Materials for future fencing

should be prepared.

Fodder.—Cut and steam the coarse and mix with corn meal, bran, cut roots, &c. Use racks in the yard to prevent

the fodder from being scattered.

Fowls should have boiled potatoes and other vegetables in addition to their regu-

Grain, if not threshed yet, thresh it as soon as possible, instead of leaving it for the rats, mice and weevil. Many farmers refused to thresh and sell their wheat when it is worth \$1 50 per bushel, and now when it is worth but about \$1, they appear to be waiting for it to fall to 75

Hogs -should-have warm (not 'hot) cooked food, and occasionally, salt or charcoal, breeding sows especially require the two last-Mules and Horses.—Give them grain

or carrots with their cut feed. Manure -Continue to collect manure and cart it to the fields, leave it in heaps covered with soil or muck, until wanted .for use. Save all the liquid drainage of the yard and stalls, by absording it with muck, leaves, sawdust, &c. All manure heaps or yards should have a covering of some kind, and should be sprinkled eccasionly with pluster, or if convenient, charcoal dust, to absorb and retain the ammonia which is continually escaping to the damage of the mannre and injury of stock.

Plowing .- Run the furrows a little deeper than last year or follow with the sub-soil plow.

Potatoes .- Assort for planting. Sheep .- Keep them well sheltered from storms and separate from cattle and horses: Let them have free access to salt and water.

Tools.—In rainy days put them in order and make such new ones as may be Turnip and other Roots .- Feed them

daily to cattle. If turnips or cabbage are fed after milking they impart no disagreeable flavor to the milk. Wood .- Lay in a supply for next win

ter.—Cut, split and place it under shelter. Don't believe that there is any economy in trying to burn green wood.

Orchard.—While the ground is not frozen, trees may be transplanted. The moss and rough bark should be scraped

from old trees, and the trunks and large limbs washed with strong soap suds or a weak solution of potash or soila. If pruning is done, the wounds should be covered with paint or a weak solution of gum shellac. Mannre the orchard with muck lime and ashes. Destroy the cocoons nests of insects.

Grape vines, if not pruned in the Fall, should be trimmed now, in moderate weath-

The importance of importing your own stock, if you are going into the wood business, is very emphatically enforced in the following capital story, that comes to us from a very ugreeable correspondent

"Some years ago I was travelling on Eastern shore of Maryland, and stopped for the night at the house of a gentleman by the name of Jones. He was not at me, but his wife received me very politely, though I was in the capacity of a travelling merchant, a peripatetic vender of notions, vulgarly called a pedlar She made a few purchases of articles useful in the family, and might have bought more had not Mr. Jones returned unexpectedly and at once commenced abusing st roundly, and suid he did'nt want any pedlars about his house. I gave him back the change in his own coin till he cooled down, when I last asked him what made him mad at all 'gentlemen in my line of business:' He told me.

"'A few mouths ago a Yankee pedlar was about here selling his tin-ware, and taking pay in anything he could get. I was quite anxious to improve my stock, and thought this was so fine an opportunity to buy an imported full-blood, as that rascal war-ranted it to be, that I just up and paid the fellow \$100, and he cut the strings and let the ram run. Sure 'enough, he did run, full split, right over the tence, ond I after him, and my niggers coming on. In fifteen minutes my ram, niggers and I fetched up in Brown's yard, when I found I had been sold as well as that rascally old sheep. Before I got back the pedlar had sold ten dollars' worth of wooden nutmegs and nonsense to my wife, and had gone off to parts unknown. He never came, this way again; and if you are one of that sort you had better put up

your traps and be moving.
"Finally I prevailed on him to lot me stay till morning, and to accept a few Yankes notions without fee or reward; But he will never forget that \$100 and his neighbor's ram.




