On moral instructions in common schools prepared by J. Hinkle, and read before the Teacher's Institute: Dec. 1857.

· The arts and sciences are marching on -ward -with-gigantic-strides in-this peculiar age of intellectual improvement, and in proportion as these ascend the "hillof science," will vain ambition develope itself and prove ruinous to its victims

unless suppressed by moral power. It has long been the cherished view of many, that moral and religious training have nothing to do in literary instutions, hence it has been, that instead of religior and philosophy marching in true friendship together to the portals of immortality, they have been set in hostile array and combats have ensued, equally inju rious to both parties. On the one hand, the infidel philosopher has been disposed to investigate the economy of nature without any reference to nature's God. (Who Pesides Over All Its Movements) as if the vast unlimited union were a self moving, and independent machine; and he has not unfrequently had the effrontery to throw out insinuations, as tigonist'o o the sacred truths of divine revelation. Whilst his opponent, the christian minister, perhaps on the other hand, under the influence of intemperate zeal against his antagonist, has unguardedly and injuriously declaimed against the study of science, as if it were unfriendly to sound morality and religion, has, in effect, set the "Works of God' in opposition to His Word. The crisis has arrived, when those contendingparties should effect a complete reconciliation, that by their mutual aid and the subservience of the one to the other, the moral and intellectual improvement of man might be promoted, and the holy and benevolent designs of the Deity gradually consummated; for the accomplishment of which great and wise object, morality and religion must be taught in con-nection with science in the schools of this free government.

What place on earth is there so admi' rably adapted to the inculcation of moral and pious sentiments, as the school-rooms, the academies, colleges, and universities of this land, upon which the smiles of heaven have long beamed with extraodinary refulgence? Where can access be had to the tender hearts of the rising generation, as in these sources of the nation's intelligence, these guardians of liberty, and sentinels of freedom. In these are taught the arts and sciences, all of which may be used as conductors, of moral sentiments to the juvenile mind. For in stance, in teaching natural history, which inits most comprehensive sense, embraces a knowledge and description of all the known facts in the natural or material universe, many may be taught to the great moral advantage, as well as the intellectual improvements of even quite young scholars; because all the objects which natural history embraces, are the "Workmanship of God;" each bearing the marks of His incessant Agency: His power, wisdom, and beneficence being impressed on every object-however minute, throughout the three kingdoms of nature, and through every region of earth, air, and sky.

In teaching the science of geography, (trivial as it may seem to some) ample opportunity is afforded the teacher to make occasional remarks, and give illustrations, highly promotive of the culture of moral principles amongst the people. He can assume them, that on a knowledge of the spherical figure of the earth, the art of navigation in a great measure depends; and that all the voy ages of discovery which have been made in later years, were undertaken in consequence of this known fact. But for this have remained unexplored and unknown -no regular intercourse would have been mantained between the various tribes, of our race, and consequently, the invaluable blessings of "Divine Revelation" could never have been transmitted to the great er-part of the gentile world. The nature the extent, and the vast vanity of august objects the earth contains, make geography a science of peculiar interest in a moral and religious point of view. particularly the salvation of God, which christianity unfolds, which is destined to be proclaimed in every land must receive much aid for its accomplishment from the science of Geography.

In the study of geology too, there may be lessons of morality and piety given to the youth and children of our literary institutions. This science has for its object the investigation and description of the internal structure of the Globe. It is true; man's knowledge in this science is but shallow, and very imperfect; from the fact, that the wast quantity of matter contained within the internal structure of the earth; has been penetrated but to a very limited extent; yet, the observations which have been made during the last half-century, and the deductions drawn therefrom, are highly interesting both to the philosopher, and to the christian. Previous to these last discoveries, a variety of objections were filed against the Mosaic history of creation, which we think, have been much diminished, since it has been perceived that there exists a beautiful harmony between the records of Revelation, and the operations of the Creator in the material universe. In this science, therefore, the teacher can have occasional reference to the Supreme Maker of all, and the reverence due Him from all his intelligent creatures, who are under ten thousand obligations to Him for His boundless goodness and tender mercies.

But, again. In teaching the sublime pleasing variety which appears amongs the works of the Divine architect, the it would seem to be impossible for a well educated intellect to fail in calling the juvenile mind o .ontempla e with pious motion, the grandeur and sublimity the Creator's works, as developed by the science of astronomy; of all the sciences, amongst the sons of time, none in spires the human s u' with such lofty and sublime transports of intellectual pleasure and such vast conceptions of the onergies of the "Eternal Mind," as this science. Next, attention is called to the stupendous science of natural philosophy, which has for its object the description of the phenomana of the material universe, with the view to discover their causes, and the laws by which the Almighty directs the movements of all ter-pestrial and celestial bodies. One of the ordinary uses of the noble science, is to enable men to construct the vast variety of mechanical engines, by which human labor is greatly facilitated, and the comforts of manking nacommonly increased. (Ta be continued.)


