LEGISLATIVE.

The Legislature mijourned finally on Thurs day last, after a session of less than ordinary interest. As usual, four-fifthe of the session was consumed in private legislation, leaving but little time to discuss or mature measures of public benefit. To Messra Fetter, Stuart, McClure and others, we are under many obligations for legislative favors, especially so to Mr. Stunrt, whose daily attention to the Herald, in this respect, is fully appreciated During the entire session, on every question, untram melled by party ties, Mr. Stuart has shown himself a man of prudent, conservatives feeling, and as long as Cumberland county must be represented by a democrat, she can send no more worthy man than Hugh Stuirt. gr

Among the public acts, which distinguish the late session, is the bill for the sale of the State Canals, to the Sunbury and Eric Railroad, the effect of which is an immense saving to the State, in the abolishment of the Cana Board, whether the immediate proceeds of the sale shall be beneficial or not. The C mal Board remain in office until the meeting of the next Legislature, to settle up the business, after which period,

"Othello's occupation's gone." Another measure of general interest is the License Law. The new law throws open in wide door to all who wish to engage in the liquor truffic, and establishes free trade in rum. We hope to see such at opposition-organized against it, as will, by the meeting of the next Legislature, expunge it from the Statute Book.

The democratic maj rity of the Senate disgraced that body, by passing an act to abelish Judge Wilmot's district, for the purpose of legislaring him out of office. The motive wa too transparent to deceive any one. It was vindictive prestitution of power, to punish a political opponent-a petty scheme of revenge aby which men who prefix honorable to their numes, thought to shelter themselves behind their legislative position, and, assassin-like amb Judge Wilmot in the dark. The House however, gallantly came to the rescue, and killed the bill, thus saving the Legislature from the consummation of a g eat wrong.

The Legislature also passed a law requiring the appointment of three Commissioners to codity the penal laws of the State, each Com missioner to receive a salary of two thousand dollars. The Governor has appointed Judge Lewis, Attorney General KNOX and Mr. Buck ALLW Commissioners under the law.

#### CONGRESSIONAL.

The Committee of Conference, to whom wa referred the disagreement between the two Houses, on the Lecompton, bill, have resorted to a di-graceful trick, by which they hope to impose the Lecompton Constitution on the

people of Kan-as, and there by achieve the long deferred trium h of the Alministration. The bill now reported by Mr. Emplish provides that a certain Land Ordinance, donating to the pro ple of Kansas glarge amount of public land, shall be submitted to a gote of the people in connection with the Lecompton Constitution. If the hill and ordinance is accepted, their Kansas shall be admitted by proclamation o the President. But, if the people of Kinsus reject the Constitution, c upled with this bribe of pub is land, they are to auffer the ponulty of being kept in a territorial condition, until such time as Kansas shall have a population sufficient to entitle her to a representative in the House, under the apportionment, the ratio of which is nearly 100,000. As years may elapse before that amount of population is renched, with the element of slavery already engrafted in the Territory, the people of Koneas may be tempted to adopt the Lecomptor froud, however repugnant, baited, as it is, with a grant of lands, in order to avoid greater

evils. vils.

The Administration, having been defeated in every attempt to force Lecompton through the House, are now resorting to contemptable trickery to gain their object. With a bille in one hand, and a whip in the other, they say to the people of Kansas, "You must vote for the Loumpton Constitution, with its protection of slavery, and all its frauds, or we will keep you out of the Confederacy, until you are lashed into submission " This is the pure english of Mr. English's bill, and we leave the sutject for our readers to make their own comments.
