Galls On Horses.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. It is bad economy to use a poor harness. The collar, especially, should always be in good condition. It should be frequently washed and oiled; an occasional pounding will keep it soft and in good shape - Whenever it becomes thin or broken pads should be worn under-

Galls are occasioned often by putting horses to hard work all at once, after a period of-rest, us in the spring, after the rest of winter. As a means of preparing the horse for such work, it is well to bathe his breast and back with a solution of alum and whiskey for several days before the labor begins. It is well to use this preparation also at any other time when the skin seems tender. We have known small sores to heal up entirely under the? use of this remedy, even though the horse was kept at work.

It is another excellent preventive of galls to bathe the shoulders and breast of a working horse once or twice a week, at night, with salt and water, washing off the same with pure water in the morning

When the skin becomes badly broken a horse should be allowed a few days' rest, or if work is very pressing the harness should be so padded as not to irritate the sores; otherwise it will be vain to expect a cure. Some of our neighbors use white lead, mixed with linseed oil, (common paint,) to cure galls. And they often succeed with it; at least they get a hard incrustation over the broken skin. But we hardly fancy this tonning a horse's hide while he is yet wearing it.

Growing Chinese Sugar Cane.

Iu reply to "Agricola" as to the best mode of raising the Chinese sugar cane, · I believe the plan I pursued last year very good, as the result proved well. The ground was plowed and prepared as for corn and the seed dropped in rows by hand (as it was very scarce) about twelve inches apart and four feet the other on ground that would have brought about. twenty bushels of corn to the acre. On parts during the season a small quantity of grano was used, which enhanced the growth more than twofold. All was plowed three times, and the cutting commenced about the 15th of September. The yield of seed, I believe, if it had been properly saved, would have been seventy-five bushels to the acre and the amount of fodder three tons. The amount of molasses varied as the season progressed, making more and more, till towards the 10th of December, when the vinous fermentation set in but even then a splendid brandy could have been made from the cane. All kinds of stock fed most ravenously upon it till the fermentation took plac, and even then cows and hogs did not stop eating it .- All farmers, large and small, should sow some, from one half to ten acres. I believe firmly that one acre of the produce is worth on the farm more than ten of corn, but I advise none to cultivate it as a surplus erop.—Baltimore Sun.

How Moisture Affects the Value or Wood .- When wood is newly cut, it contains a large quantity of water (soap,) varying in different varieties from 20 to 50 per cent! Trees contain more water in those seasons when the flow of sap is active, than when the growth is suspended, and soft woods contain more becomes air dried, and parts with about half its water, 15 per cent, more may be expelled by artificial heat, but before it oses the last of its moisture, it begins to decompose, or char. The presence of water in wood diminishes its value as fuel in two ways; it hinders and delays the combu-tive process, and wastes heat by evaporation. Suppose that 100 p muds wood contain 30 of water, they have then but 70 of true combustive material. When burned, I pound of the wood will be expended in raising the temperature of the water at the boiling point, and 6 more in converting it into vapor; making a loss of 7 pounds of real wood, or 110 of the combustive force. Besides this dead loss of 10 per cent of fuel. the water present is an annoyance by hindering free and rapid combustion.

MANURE .-- We have frequently cautiand farmers not to bury their manure-too deep in the soil, as the tendency of their iuices...is downward-not upward A writer in an exchange says: "I have found in all experiments that the nearer I kept the manure to the top of the ground, the more I got from it. I spread at the rate of thirty to forty loads of manure:) I then put the plough in from ten to twelve inches deep-It was an old fashioned plough and turned it over very flat and smooth .- The rest of the piece I ploughed about eight inches deep I treated the piece all alike, after that, until I laid it down. I meant to put it where the ammonia would not escape. I watched the field for six or seven years, and I could not see any difference in the crops, where this extra manure was put, till I took the piece again, and then I purposely put the plough down so as to bring up my lost manure to the light and heat, and it told the story for the next seven years where it was.

SPRAINS .- A gentleman of Collinsville, Illinois, writes that having a severely sprained ankle he took a teacupful of com mon salt and a pint of sweet milk and boiled them together till of the consistency of a poultice; then spread this on a cloth and bound it round the ankle. The next morning there was a little weakness, but t.o sore. e s : n l lameness were all gone. Our correspondent says that cider vinegar with salt is also good, and just as good for horses and cattle as for men, and should be applied in the same


