SAVOY BISCUIT .- Four eggs, separate the whites from the yolks, heat the whites to a stiff froth, then add the yolks, beat both tegether a long time, then add 1 a pound of sugar, 1 a teaspoonful of lemon juice, 1 of a pound of flour, stirring the whole very hard, with a spoon lay them or white paper in an oblong shape, dusting sugar over them; the oven should be rather brisk; they will bake in a few minutes

a delicate brown. Kisses.—Two pounds of powdered edgar, the white of 8 eggs heat to a stiff froth; the sugar should then be added; flavor with lemon or vanilla. The whole should be beaten very hard a few minutes, then drop in oval shapes on white paper; place in a moderate oven; bake them to a pale brown; they should then be taken from the paper, placing the flat sides together while warm; it will be found a very handsome dish for an evening party. The above quantity will make two large disbfuls.

Put the eggs in without beating; after it has risen the second time, add nine nutmegs, half a pint of brandy, three pounds raisins, one teaspoonful soda and milk sufficient for wet

ting, and yeast.
DOUGH CAKE.—Four cups flour, two cups sugar, one cup butter, two cups eggs, spoonful pearlash, raisins.

FARMER'S PUDDING .- Page and slice nearly two quarts of sour app es; put them in a kettle with half a pint of warm wat er. - Make a biscuit dough, roll it out and lay it over the apples; cover this with a piece of cloth, and on this lay a plate.-Boil half or three quarters of an hour un til done The dough can be made as follows; One teaspoonful_saleratus, two teaspoonsful cream tartar, one teacup oream, (or milk and butter,) one quart flour; wet it with milk; salt. Boil slowly that it may not catch to the kettle. This is

This recipe in y wife considers her own invention, as she has never seen it. It is simple and efficient for raising buckwheat cakes and bread very light and very white if the flour W. T. L. is good.

GINGER BREAD WITHOUT SALERATUS. One pound of sugar, one pound of but-ter, three pounds of flour, two tablespoonsful of ginger, one gill of cream, one pint of incluses. Rub the butter in the flour, add the other ingredients. Roll out the dough, cut into cakes, place them on but-tered tins, and bake in a moderately cool oven Wash the cakes over with molasses and water before you bake them.

ANOTHER .- Half a pound of sugar half a pound of butter, one pound and a half of flour, one ounce of ginger, one pint of molasses. Rub the flour and but ter well together, add the other ingredients. Roll out the dough, cut it in cakes, place them on tins. Wash them. over with molasses and water and bake them in a very moderate oven,

How To Boil Fish.

For all kinds of fish put two spoonsful of sait to every quart of water; put the fish in with the water cold; remove the cover and only let the water sinn er. Try with a skewer whether the flesh of the fish stick to the bone; if so, it is not enough, if the flesh drop, it is too much cooked.
