#### WORK FOR JUNE.

The great corn crop is truly the staff of life of the country. Now, during the present month, it requires the especial care of the cultivator. Let it be thinned early, as soon as it is out of danger, from birds and worms. Start the cultivators in at an early day, to clean out the rows in each direction, and go over quickly with the hoes to clear away the grass that may be starting about the young plants. It is desirable to have the corn laid by by harvest; it should never be worked after it shows any sign of tassel ing. Every root and rootlet is wanted then for the production of grain, and to put in plow or cultivator to cut them off or tear them up is simply murderous,-If you have allowed the grass to dispute possession with the corn let them "light The chances will be in favor of it out." the corn; but if you lose that you make a crop of grass, and that is about as much as such cultivation deserves; otherwise you make neither corn nor grass., The great rule in corn cultivation is to work early and work quickly; that is, before the corn gets large, and without too long intervals between the workings. Corn that has been thoroughly and quickly worked from the start need not be touch ed after it rises above the hips of an ordinary man.

As to the mode of working' the rule is to work deep before planting and shallow after; a mere stirring of the surface is what is wanted now. For this purbose the ordinary corn cultivator is sufficient With the best management, however, and especially on tobacco farms, the crop will sometimes get "in the grass," and to get it out the plow is essential. Every one must judge for himself of this emergency. Work with the mould board to the corn, throwing the earth well up, without breaking the corn. A good plowing in June thoroughly subdues the grass and if done while the corn is small, and well done, it does not materially injure it. HAY-MAKING.

Crops of clover and orchard grass will be ready for harvest early in the month. The fit time for cultivating clover is when about one-half of the blossoms have turn ed brown. It is especially important, however, with this crop, to take time by the forelock, and if opportunity and weather permit it is well to begin earlier.

The succulency of clover makes it hard to cure well' and from bad curing cloves hay has got an ill-repute, which it by no means deserves. It is needless to say that the hay-making requires the utmos care and dilligence to bring it to a speedy conclusion. Cure in good swarths thrown lightly up, that the air may penetrate, and with as little exposure as may be to the scorching sun. Should rain threaten, even that which is least cured may be safely put-into small cocks laid lightly up -Some persons prefer curing altogether in such cocks. The leaves and finer portions of the plants are better preserved the stems go through a gentle fermentation, and the necessary handling and exposure on an airy day in taking it to the stack or house cures it sufficiently The principal objection to this method is that it takes too long time and prevent that despatch in getting important jobs off hand which is very desirable.

# WHEAT HARVEST.

Time of Cutting .- The most impor tant direction on this point is to be ready for the work whenever the work is ready for you; and then be watchful and ascertain by your personal examination in the field the very earliest period at which you may begin. It is hard to estimate the worth of a day should the weather become unpropitous; but under favorable weather there is loss both in quantity and quality of the grain by allowing it to be overripe. When the grain gets into the dough state it is safe to cut it. On the other hand do not be tempted by undue haste to cut so green as to cause the grain to shrivel. There is a right time for everything, and with these hints for your guide tax your own care and watchfulness to find out just when that time is.

# FIELD PEA.

. It is not too late at any time this month to sow broadcast or plant for seed the field pea. If planted only for the use of the servants plant between the corn-hills immediately after the last working of corn, if that be this month, otherwise plant elsewhere. PUMPKINS AND CYMLINGS.

These may be planted as late as the middle of the month.

POTATOES AND PEAS -A writer in the London Agricultural Gazette relates the following curious experiment worth the attention of agriculturists:

"I tried a curious experiment with few potatoes this season. Twelve months since I saw a letter from a farmer stating the great success that had attended an experiment the writer had made the previous season. It consisted in inserting a pearin-each potato set and planting the potato in the usual way. The result, he stated, was a yield of peas and a splendid crop of potatoes. But the most important result was the entire freedom of the potatoes so-treated from any disease, while those planted in the usual way in the same field were extensively deteriorated. I was led, by this statement, to try the experiment on a small scale in my own garden this season I planted not quite half a peck, only fifty sets, in ranks, cutting a piece out of each and putting a pea firmly in. The peas grew up and flourished well, and last week I dug the potatoes. They were perfectly free from all taint or speck of disease and very fine and large, while in the same bed close to them was another lot 'planted in the same old style, nearly half of which were rotten. I leave your readers to draw their own conclusious '

CABBAGE PLANTS .- The cut-worm is frequently a source of much annoyance to the gardener as well as destructive to plants. A very simple and effectual remedy against the onslaught of these pests is to provide yourself with a bunch of hickory leaves prior to setting out your plants, then, as you take a plant in hand, also take a leaf and roll it lo around the stem of the plant, funnel like. The lower edge of the leaf should be some little distance above the roots of the plants. so that about one-half the leaf will protrude above ground. This will form a barrier that the boldest enemy of the worm species will seldom have courage to scale As to going through the leaf, they will never do it, as they are quite repugnant to such game. This is a remedy that I have always applied with success. It is accessable to all, therefore


