Hints from the Houghman.

The venerable editor of the Massachusetts Ploughman gives the fellowing practical hints, derived from his long experience, on the subjects named:

A PLOW THAT GOES ALONE.-We have one of Martin's plows on hand which requires no holding. We have formerly spoken of Martin's iron plows, which we prefer to any that have been shown to us. His mould plate is long, so as to turn the furrows well, and ther there is less of gearing and head dress

The chief fault which we found this plow was that the beam was too short for the plain land on our own farm. But we had a remedy. We took off all the head gearing which bristled up too much for the safety of the feet of the team and bolted a broad iron plate under the fore end of the beam, making holes in the plate, to hook the draft chain and making the beam, with the plate, ten inches longer than it was -We have three holes at the fore end of this plate, abreast of each other, so that we can hook the chain to make the plow run more or less to land and take a wide or narrow furrow.

We used this plow last week on Tuesday on a plain green sward field, which we have since planted with cornfound that we could make the plow take a wide or a narrow forrow by placing the chain hook to the Night or lett.—The field was about thirty rods long, and after going a few rounds we found that the plow was so well balanced that it required no one to hold it. We uctually plowed four or five furrows nearly thirty rods long without touching the handles of the plow. It went alone and cut a straighter furrow than we often have had cut by men who had hold of the handles.

This is a large story, but as we had half a doxen witnesses of the transaction we venture to publish it. A witness who was present remarked that as our oxen went without a driver and our plow without a holder he thought we might dismiss our men and trust entirely to the team

WEANING CALVES .- The best mode of weaning is to keep the calves in the barn on hay. And whether they are permitted to suck the cow three days or three months they should not be turned out to grass, provided you can procure good hay.—Calves will readily eat good fine hay when they are two or three weeks old, but they will not then eat grass enough to keep a grasshopper alive.

We often see young calves tethered out in gardens and on headlands where the richest clover grows; yet they always seem pining for something to eat. And when they have slops given them and all manner of stuffing they look poor and emaciated. One reason is, the flies pester them exceedingly when out in the open daylight, but in a barn properly closed the flies are seldom seen. It costs les on most farms to feed on hay in the bari than to funnish a pasture for young calves, and now_at_this time the new grass may be mown and dried for them. A little out meal may be given them daily at less cost than to carry the same out to the field, and we save all the manure.

WASHING FRUIT TREES .- June i the best month to apply a wash to trees, let the wash be strong or weak. June is the time when insects fly and deposit their eggs on the trees.

We now repeat our recomendation to use potash water in preference to any other wash, because it has power to de stroy animal life while it is not injurious to vegetation. One pound of good potash will make a gallon of liquid suitable for apple trees. We have heard people as ert that such a wash is too strong. We have also heard that some men have let their potish water, stand out in an open kettle till the one half of it had evanor oted and then applied the sediment to wash young trees. This sediment would be twice as strong as that which we recomend.

A Few Words about Sheep.

-Although there are many so-called different breeds of sheep in England they may be divided into two distinct genera —the Longwools and the Shortwools. The latter include the Down sheep, of Sussex (Southdowns) Hampshire, etc. the former comprehend the Leicester, the Lincoin, the Cotswold, the Romney Marsh sheep, etc. The Southdown is the type of the one: the Leicester of the other

The first great improver in sheep-breed ing was Mr. Robert Bakewell, a gentleman farmer of Dishley, near Loughborough in Leicestershire, who, about the year 1755, turned his attention to the subject. His flock consisted of the old beicester sheep, like the Lincoln, an ungainly, razor-backed animal; and the symmetrical form of the twenty-month wethers is due to his exertions and those of his

successors. The Leicester sheep are almost universal in the midland counties, sharing the pastures of the north with the Chevoir and black-faced breeds, of the east with the Lincoln, and of the west with the Cotswold and Welsh mountain sheep .-The cross between a Leicester and a Highland sheep is always productive of a good result, the offspring combining the better wool of the former with the more delicate

mutton of the latter. Mr. Ellman, of Glynde, near Lewes, began, in the year 1780, with Southdowns what Bakewell had accomplished with Leicesters The Southdowns take their name from their original habitat—the hilly district running along the south coast. The quality of their mutton is universally celebrated. It is said that at one time their wool was almost black, and its present black color and their black faces would lead to the supposition. The Hampshire and the Wiltshire Down sheep resemble the Southdowns in many respects but are larger and coarser, and are always improved by a cross with their more re-

fided relations of Sussex.

The Duke of Richmond and Mr. Rigden in the South, and Mr. Overman and Lord Walsingham in Norfolk, are among the followers of Ellsman; while Mr. Jonus Webb in Cambridgeshire, has supplanted the old breed of sheep with Southdowns The yearly gatherings at Babrakam are famous. There the whole sheep farmings world assembles, and thence are the Southdown sheep disseminated into the utmost corners of the globe. The flock may be almost considered the most useful stock on a farm. On an arable farm, besides being most profitable in themselves they are the most efficient manure distri buters; and to feed sheep well on the land is often better than to manure it directly. In mountain districts they are almost the only stock braving the winter and subsisting on the scantiest of berbage but well repaying the farmer for the at tention he may bestow on them.
