The engine was brought into the ring! at an early hour in the day, steam was ted time, and with a wagon attached containing a band of sixteen busicious playing popular airs, she started around the track amid the cheers of the immense crowd which had collected to witness the performance. The evidence of the perfeet control which the engineer had over it was emigently satisfactory to all. It as proposed to have the plowing trial take place in the ring, so that not only the committee and press, but the entire crowd, could have a fair of portunity of witnessing the operations. But the committee thought otherwise, and ordered it out of the ring to give place to some horses or jacks, much to the dissat-isfaction of the people. Why, the practical bearing which antinvention like this has on the welfare and destiny of the human race is worth as many jackasses, the tails of which would make a rope long enough and strong enough to string all the planets of the solar system together like onions in a farmer's kitchen.

In the afternoon the machine was taken out into the prairie, followed by an immense crowd, the plows, five in number, attached, and the work commenced. Many predicted a failure, and all were prepared to see one if it should occur The ground was almost as hard and dry as a bone, the short silky grass was very thick; rendering traction apparently impossible; but the inventor, nothing daunted, made the start, amid the almost breathless expectation of the crowd, and as the machine moved off to the distance of about one hundred yards, dragging 'b hin l it five plows, each cutting twelve inches of the hard ground and turning it over in heavy ridges, a shout was sent, ap long and loud, and which, perhaps, is still travelling over the broad prairies, telling tie tired horse of rest; lingering about the cottage of the husbanduran; whispering of peace, plenty, and a higher destiny, and proclaiming the glad tidings of an event fraught with an importance to civilization and human development of the greatest magnitude. Plowing by steam is a reality.

The inventor, Mr. Fawkes, was called out at the conclusion of the trial to make a speech. He tried to excuse himself, but the crowd would accept no excuse Mounting the engine amid prolonged applause, he said: "Gentlemen, I thank you a thousand times for this manifestation of your kind feelings towards me. I will state in the first place I am no orator, but like enough you will find this out before I get through. [Laughter and applause.] This is the first speech I ever attempted to make; this is the first plow I ever attempted to make, and if I meet with the success in making an orator that I have in making a steam plow, I will have no cause of complaint. I was born in old Lancaster county—the county that has given you a Fulton. [Applause.] 1 was born poor and am still without means. It is no dishonor to be a poor man, but it is very unhandy to a man who is getting up a steam plow. [laughter.] Butthrough the instrumentality of Mr. J. C. Dickinson, who is now upon the ground, I have been enabled to devote my energies to this invention for the last two years, and you see the result .- The first engines I had built were made in Philadelphia, but they were too small, and I never took them from the shop. I then had these made, tried them in the city, and found that they could draw about twelvethousand pounds on a dead drag. Then I took it down to my native place, Christiana, about fifty miles from Philadelphia, and made a trial. The machinery was new, the boxes got to cutting, the engines would not work - the people laughed at me and my machine. But 1 did not get disheartened. The prond spirit of American energy was within me. I knew I was right and bound to succeed! [Cheers.]

I told Mr. Dickinson to give me the means and I would 'put her through.' With a generosity which would do honor to the noblest heart in this Union, he made the sacrifice. I went to work; you see the result. If you do not like it Say so, and turn me out without the pre mium. If you award it to me, it shall be expended in perfecting the machine if you do not think me worthy of it, you must take it off the books, or I will one day-take it off for you-rest assured of -[Three cheers for American in-

Mr. Dickinson being called on, madea few remarks detailing the trials of the inventor, who first brought the model of the machine to him in a pocket handkerchief, and spoke eloquently of his subse-quent-success. At the conclusion of his remarks, the audience gave him three cheers for his liberality in assisting the inventor in bringing out the machine. Everybody was filled with enthusiasm at the success of the trial, except one of the jackass committee, who a links it will do 'purty well, but thar's nothin' in the world like oxin.' The committee examine the plow to-morrow, and make a report on its claims.

PICKLED TOMATOES. - Take small smooth tomatoes, not very lipe; scald them until the skin will slip off easily and sprinkle salt over them. After they have stood twenty-four hours, drain off the juice and pour on boiling hot pickle composed of one pound of sugar to every quart of vinegar and two tea-spoonsful each of cinnamon and cloves. Drain off the liquid, scald it and pour it on their again every two days for a week, and they will require no further care.

TOMATO CATSUP. - Take one-half bushel of tomatoes, scald them and press them through a common sieve. them down one-half; then add two table spoonsful of salt, one of black pepper one half of cloves, one-half of cine and one-half of mace Mix well, and add one teacupful of vinegar. Bottle and seal and set in a good place. Pre served in this way, they retain their natural flavor.

PALLIATIVE FOR TOUTHACHE. - A little horseradish scraped and laid on the wrist of the side affected will, in many cases, give speedy relief. A better way is to place a little scraped horseradish in the mouth or the tooth, or just around the gum. It relieves rheumatic pains in the gum and face also. The mouth may afterwards be rinsed with a little camphorated water, lukewarm.
