MANAGEMENT OF PASTURES. - The seeding and manuring of meadows has re-cently received some notice in our col-We would now turn to an equally important question, one, perhaps needing fuller discussion, viz: the management of pastures. We shall draw some hints from Ther's Principles of Agriculture. though ant confining ourself to that or

any particular authority. 1 Pastures should be entirely free from stagnant water to be fired to the production of good grasses and to prevent injury thereon. On swampy ground drains should not only be provided but they should be kept in order. However well such land may be seeded at first, and how ever valuable the first crop may prove, if the drains become stopped and water remains on the ground late in the spring, the cultivated grasses in time give way to coarser herbage; water grasses, flags and rushes take their place. This fact has come within the observation of every fur-In many cases a few days' workwould go fur to remody the wil - an level land a good system of surface draining could be provided and kept open at a smallexpense. On favorable sinations, underdrains would be far more permanent and thorough in operation, and hence more economical in the end.

2. Pastures should not be allowed to grow up to weeds, and yet how few there are which are not worally disfigured in: appearance and lessened in product by these "pests of the farm." Thistles, it pariicular, multiply with great rapidity in rich pastures, for eattle will not touch then.; consequently the seed ripen and -takes root - They not only destroy the grass by taking its place, but prevent est the from eating it near their thorny leaves The evil is easily remedied If mown with a scythe a few times during the flowering season, they will eventually disappear, besides cattle will cat them in withered state. Most other weeds yield to the same treatment-all will do so if it is perseveringly applied, and the pas-... ture is at the same time encouraged, by seeding and inspure, in the production of

3. Occasional attention to spreading the manure dropped by the cattle and horses at rest will, in most cases, prove advantageous. If the dung is left undivided, the plants it covers are at first comstrong, coarse tufts of grass shoot up, which the cattte will not touch, unless comfelled by hunger. If the manure is spread, on the contrary, the growth of grass is increased, and the distasteful fla-

vor is very slightly, if at all injurious. 4. Pastures should never be crowded with a greater number of cattle than they; can properly support. Heavy stocking checks vegetation. The plants have not time to attain any growt ; the cattle bite ; off their tops, and then tear them up, by the roots. The injurious effects of this course are very evident. For the same and other reasons, cattle must not be turned into pastures too early in the year, or kept there too late.

5. On the other hand it is equally injurious to a pasture to grazed by too small a number of cattle or other stock. The pasture if not fully used, will loose the return it might give, it is also impover-ished by neglect. The herbage shoots up luxuriantly, and some grasses cattle refuse after they attain full growth. These kind consequently increase and strength-on, while the finer kinds of herbage, closely consumed by stock and crowded by the stronger plants, decrease and dissappear, In permanunt pastures, losses more fre quently result from this cause than any other And from those which, stand for a few years only, the full benefit is not derived, unless they are fed off with proper amount of stock in due season. Clover especially needs some care in this respect It should attain a fine start in the spring before feeding, and then sufficient stock should be turned in to consume the whole product. Then all should be turned into other fields, and a few weeks rest will give a new, fresh growth to the pasture, which under a different course of treatment, we have already found to assume a spotted appearance, the grass in some parts having reached mature growth, while in oth-

ers was closely consumed.

We have said nothing of seeding and culture, or of the application of fertilizers, each of these appropriately furnish subjects by themselves, which have and will receive due attention in our columns. The question of changing pastures, and of the kinds of stock which should graze together or be kept seperate, remains for discussion. Will correspondents give us their views and experience on the whole subject of managing pasture lands?-Rural New Yorker. ...

TO MAKE YOUNG PEAR TREES GROW -1 was afflicted by the sight in my garden for four or five years the most luxu rient and thrifty young pour trees, which would not bear, but all their strength ran to wood. Vexed at this, I resolved to try the effect of bending down the branbhes so as to check the flow of sap, and cause to form fruit buds instead of wood buds. Accordingly, the first of December I filled my pockets with stort twine; I drove down some small pegs into the ground beneath my trees (which had branched low, so as to make dwarfish heads); I then tied a string to the end of every long shoot, and gradually bringing down the end of the limb till it curv ed down so as to make a considerable bend or bow. I fastened it in that, either by tying the other end of the string to peg, or to another branch, or to a part

of the trunk. According to my expectation, the tree next year changed its, habits of growth, set an abundance of fruit buds Since that, I have had plentiful crops of fruit without trouble.—Take good care not to let many branches go on the up right-system, - Cor Hort.


