CULTIVATION OF THE SUGAR CANE the cultivation of the Sugar Cane as a branch of agriculture, we give the result of an experiment by Mr. John W. Craighead of South Middleton township About the 10th of May last, he planted the ninth part of an acre, and cultivated it the same as an ordinary crop of corn. It was cut in October, and crushed and Fre sed in a temporary mill made of two iron rollers attached to the horse-power of a threshing machine -The cane yielded two barrel of juice, from which he made fifteen gallons of syrup, with about the same amount of time and labor as would be required to make a kettle of applebutter. No doubt, with proper machinery for crushing and pressing, the yield

would have been greater. We are indebted to Mr. Craighead for a sample of this syrup, which we found excellent for table use.
