THE HOUSEWIFE.

To ROAST BEEF .- Rib roast is that part where the ribs commence, on the fore quarter to the back of the ox. The first wo or three ribs is called the first cut, the next two or three the second cut; these two cuts are the best to roast. Cut off all the the bones, and saw the ribs in two places, carefully out of all soiled or duty places, if any, then wipe it all over with a clean cloth wrung out of cold water. Then rub it all over with find sall, put it in a pan to roast, with not too strong a fire to burn it. In half an hour take it out and drain the gravy into a bowl, buste it with the fat, and dust on flour-all-over the mont; this must be done.

every h If hour, until the meat is roasted. which will keep the gravy from being burnt. Take up the meat, skim some of the fat from the top of the bowl and pour it into the pan, dust in some flour, let it boil and stir it until it thickens. N. B. A roast of ten pounds will take two and a half to three hours to cook. If you roast before a fire-place; you can let the

gravy remain in the pan.
A sirlo'n of beef, or a loin of veul, can be roasted in the same way. In sirloin of beef the suct must not be roasted—it will spoil the gravy.

TO MAKE A STUUFING, FOR ALL KINDS OF MLAT AND POULTRY .- Take a fivecent loaf stale baker's wheat bread. 'Rub it up fine; save out in a bawl one-quarter pirt; put the rest into a pan, and jam-itwith a potato masher; put in about two ounces butter, or fat salt pork cut fine, two fresh eggs, a table spoonful of sweetherbs, thyme sweet marjoram, and summer savory, equal parts rubbed fine, tea-spoonful of salt, or to the taste, tablespoonful of flour, and thicken with the dry bread till quite thick.

To ROAST A LEG OF VEAL.—Cut out the bone with a sharp carving knife. Fill up the hole with stuffing, and skewer the lappet over to keep in the stuffing, N. For a leg of ten pounds, roast for three hours with a steady fire; the same for beef.

Hind quarters of wether mutton, be roasted in the same time as beef; if you wish to stuff it, take out the kidney, and stuff under flank, and skewer down Hind quarter of lamb can be roasted in the same way.

TO A LA-MODE BEEF .- Take about ten pounds of good fatted beef, cut deep holes with the carving knife, and fill in with stuffing (see No. 3,) rub all over with fine salt; lay two or three strong hard wood sticks across the bottom of the pot to keep the meat from the water; put In lluff a pint of water; lay in the meat; put on the lid of the pot and paste paper around it to keep in the steam; cook a bout three hours with very moderate fire. Take up the meat and sticks, and dust in some flour; let it boil and stir it until it thickens the gravy .- Ohio Valley Far-

GINGER CAKE .- One pint of best molasses; two teaspoonfuls saleratus; one of alum, dissolved in a little boiling water; one half tea-cup shortening-stir pretty thick-ginger to your taste.

BUTTERMILK BREAD. - Scald three quarts of buttermilk at night, let it cool a little, stir in flour until it is rather stiff, when cold, stir in a cup of good yeast or a cake. In the morning, scald three quarts of buttermilk, and put in it six teaspoor fuls saleratus, (a teaspoon to every quart of milk,) pour this in the rising while hot, and mix as soft as possible.

SPONGE GINGERBREAD. - Take half a cup of melted butter, I tablespoonful of gigger; 1 pint of molasses; stir in flour to make it hick, then add & pint of sweet milk, 1 tablespoonful saleratus, flour enough to roll—bake in a quick oven.

Nice Rusk -One coffeecup of sugar, 1 of milk, I teacup of yeast, butter size an egg. 2 eggs—beat all together—add flour.

BREAD PUDDING .- One quart sweet milk, 2 eegs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup of butter, I nutmeg-thicken the whole with bread, chopped fine; 1 cup raisins.

RICE PUDDING .- Tie up in a bag I eup of rice, I cup of raisins: put the whole into a kettle of boiling water and

SAUCE FOR PUDDING. - Melt 1 cup of sugar; add to it & cup of butter, & cup of

brandy, 1 nutmeg, serve hot. CUP CAKE .- One cup of butter, 2 cups of sugar, 3 cups of flour and 4 eggs. .

STONGE CAKE .- Four eggs, 2 cups of sugar, 2 cups of flour. Cookies.—One cup of sugar, rolled

fine; I cup of butter; 1 cup of sour milk and I teaspoonful saleratus.

LOAF CAKE -One cup butter, 2 of sugar, 3 of dough, 4 eggs. BUCKWHEAT CAKES, after standing to rise all night, are much improved by add-

ing, just-before-baking, a tencup-of-sour cream or rich buttermilk and a little, sal eratis. This improves the flavor and makes them richer and lighter. As the senson for cakes is at hand we hope the virtues of this recipe will be thoroughly tested.

Preserving Celery.

Our celery would keep sometimes until May, had it the chance. We always pre-serve it out of doors by filling in the stalks taken elsewhere between two standing rows, being careful to place the stalks upright and not in contact with other stalks, having dirt well-packed in between them. After the whole is prepared, the mound is well spanked with the spade, leaving the tops of the celery just peeping out at the apex; this is covered with straw or any dry garden haulm, and then a roofing of old boards complete the business.

This season we shall try another process -allowing the celery to remain in the rows as it grows, banking it up well and secuting as before. We are satisfied in ndvance that this is the true mode of keep in : celery. The less it is disturbed the better, only protect it against moisture and atmospheric changes.

Fried Oysters.

. Take large oysters from their own li-. quor on a thickly-folded napkin; then take a tablespoon of lard and one half a teaspoon of salt hot, in a thick-bottomed. frying pan. Dip each oyster in flour or rol ed ceackers a d lay them in the frying pan in I fry gently until one side is a deleate brown, and then turn them by sliding a tork under.—Some people like a very little of the liquor poured in the pan after the oysters are done; let it boil up and pour over the oysters.
