CONGRESSIONAL.
Although the Session previous to the adjournment for the holidays, was short, the results so far, have not been without importance.

The old soldier's bill, has passed the House by a large majority, and its passage in the Senate, is confidently looked for. The confirmation by the Senate, of all the Naval nominations, restoring many gallant officers to active service, who had been placed on the retired list, has given general satisfaction, and is another feature of the session.

The Pacific Railroad bill, which is still pending in the Senate, will probably be brought to a conclusion, shortly after the reassembling of Congress.

The question of most interest to the people now, whether or not, Congress will at the present session, revise the Tariff. The present deficiency in the revenue, and depression of trade and manufactures, are strong arguments in favor of a return to specific duties, but as the Democrats are committed against this policy, it is much to be feared that this measure, so vitally important to the interests of Pennsylvania, though it should pass the House will again be killed in the Senate.

Notwithstanding Locofoco opposition, a time will come when the people of Pennsylvania will force a hearing on that subject, Mr. Cameron has already presented one hundred and thirty-six memorials, all numerously signed by citizens of every county in the State of Pennsylvania, setting forth the amount of capital invested in the iron industry, and demonstrating against the large quantities of foreign iron thrown into this country at ruinous rates, and calculated to embarrass if not destroy American enterprise in that branch of industry.

Legislation.—The Legislature of Pennsylvania met yesterday at Harrisburg, but the time at which our paper goes to press prevents us from giving a full and complete report of either the Senate, or House. Next week we shall be able to give the Governor's message, and the list of the officers elected by each House, with the proceedings of the Legislature as far as they may be published.

In the House the American Republicans have a majority of 37.
