To Sidney Leorge Fisher, Corresponding Secretary of the Philadelphia Agricultural Society.:

In the latter part of the year 1856 and beginning of the year 1857 there were distributed by the Patent Office small parcels of the seed of the Sorghum, or Chinese Sugar Cane, for the purpose of having it experimented upon as an article to be introduced into the agriculture of the country. I had little or no faith in its adaption to the litting and climate of Pennsylvania, but I planted a few rows of the seed in my garden, and distributed several small parcels to my neighbors, who also planted it in the same way. The

plant grew finely. I myself made no experiments as to its product in syrup-or-sugar, but gave my cane to my scientific neighbor, Dr. Mich-ener, who added to it about the same quantity of cane raised by himself, and made an experiment of its value by using a small pair of rollers, worked by one man; to express the juice, and such implements as his own kitchen afforded to reduce the juice to syrup. He sent me a sample of the product when done, which was found to be about equal to the best New Orleans molasses, but it was evident that the clarification of the juice was imperfect. , The quantity made, however, was very satis Others of my neighbors made experiments in the same way and with the same results, no one person having plant el, perhaps, so much as the eighth part of an acre. Among them all, my triend and neighbor, Milton Conard, was the most successful.

The seed of the cane grown in 1857 was planted in the spring of 1858, by a considerable number of the neighboring farmers, in small quantities, no one per haps, attempting to grow so much as the half of an acre but myself. The cultivation and experiments of the preceeding year had been supported and illustrated by the disinterested and valuable efforts of Joseph S. Lovering, of Philadelphia, to whose timely exertions and lucid expositions upon this subject the country is greatly indebted. I had now become so well assured of the great value of the sor-ghum, as an article both of domestic and political economy, to those States where Indian com will mature, that I caused an experiment to be made upon such a scale as I thought would set at rest all doubts as to whether it could be profitably introduced into our system of agriculture in Pennsylvania. This experiment is completed, and Lherewith transmit to you the subjoined report of Milton Conard, show ing its results, for the information of the Philadelphia Society, and all others who feel an interest in the subject. It has satisfied me that the sorghum culture may be made a source of great profit to indi vidual cultivators, and will save to this State at large the whole cost of the sugar and molasses now consumed by nearly or quite three millions of people I am also persuaded that this can be done with less labor, risk, and expense than is now incurred in the cultivation of cer-

The report referred to shows that the actual product of the four acres, planted by me this season, was two hundred and seventeen gallons of syrup and forty bushels of seed to the acre—the seed weighing forty pounds to the bushel. The ground planted was part of an old orchard, with an indifferent sod. The land was broken up in April, and planted, without manure, on the first day of May -the fifteenth or twentieth would have been better; the ground was too cold, and the seed did not germinate until near ly the first of June, when it grew rapid ly. It received precisely the same culture as is applied to Indian corn. There was a partail failure in the seed to the amount of one-sixth part of the crop; a loss in the stalk from being cut too short, and a loss of at least ten per cent. from imperfect machinery for expressing the juice. These drawbacks removed, the report shows that an ordinarily favorable crop on our good lands, may be set down at 275 to 300 gallons of syrup to the acre. But taking my crop at its actual product, with all its deficiencies, and its results, as compared with the cultivation of a crop of corn, it may be fairly stated as follows:

The expense and labor of cultivating an acre of Chinese sugar cane, until it is ready to cut from the ground for manufacturing, is precisely the same as the expense of cultivating the same quantity of land in Indian corn or broom corn.

Assuming my crop to be an average one, and taking the sorghum, or cane, at this point, on land that would produce fifty bushels of corn per acre, which is an over estimate of the land put into sorghum by me, and its value, as compared with a crop of corn, is as follows;




