The editor of the "Country Gentleman," says: "Farmers and other rural residents are not universally or even generally perfectly robust, healthy and well-developed. This is clear to every observer. Fevers, liver diseases, rheumatism, consumption, and even dyspepsia, prevail widely and fatally amoing them. Doctors and apothe-caries flourish in every village. The race is deteriorating even here; and we fear that a comparison between our agricultural population and any class of city people, in equally comfortable pecuniary and social positions, would not result very favorably to the former. Povercy, degradation, fifthy streets, dingy work-shops, close counting-rooms, impure atmospheres and lack of exercise in the open air, are not the only cause of the deterioration of American men and women; for of these the farmer, as a general rule, knows nothing. In their place, he has most of the comforts and many of the luxuries of modern civilized life; enough varied and salutary evereise in the open air, where his lungs are constantly expanded by the pure breath of heaven; comparative free-dom from the harassing cares and anxieties, which, in some callings, make men prematurely old; and few temptations to

vice and irregular living.

" Active out of door life, pure air, and sun-light, surely are not noxious agencies farmers ought to be universally well-developed, robust, symmetrical, strong and healthy, and farmers' wives and daughters rosy cheeked, full bosomed, lithe, active, graceful and beautiful. If they are not so, then there must be a cause. What is it?"

[The writer then quotes from another writer on the same subject:]-

"The American farmer breathes pure air all day in the fields, but shuts himself up in a small, close, unventilated bed-room, and breathes carbonic acid allnight; he has, or may have an abundance of the best materials for a wholesome diet -the cereal grains, fruits, vegetables, pure milk, etc., but, in utter contempt of these tuxuries, he often fills his much abu ed stomach with pork and other gross and decterious kinds of food, washed down with strong tea and muddy coffee He cas too much flesh-meat, (of which pock is the worst form,) too much butter, too much fine flour brend, too many hot biscurt-, poisoned with cream of tartar and salemus, and too little coarse bread, garden vegetables, fruits, and milk. Country cookery (we are sorry to be obliged to _s_y_it)_is_generally_bad_even worse than that of the city. Saying nothing of towith which farmers sin in common with other classes, we have certainly found a cause for much of the ill-health which pre vails among our agricultural population; but there is one other circumstance un favorable to health, which should be ad verted to in passing. This is the intellectual and social stagnation which is of ten permitted to prevail in farming com munities. Farmers read, study, and think too little, and allow their lives to be too monotonous. Perfect physical well being s we have seen, requires the constant and pleasurable exercise of the intellect nd the social affections, as well as the

"The farmers need but to study and obey the laws of life and health, as their occupation gives them ample opportunity to do, to present to the world perfect specimens of healthy, vigorous, and beautiful m whood. They cannot often attribute their diseases and deformities to their vo-

HOW TO WATER PLANTS .- As a rule, further withholding of it would be detri-mental to the plants. Habitual watering does, in the majority of cases, more harm than good. Plants left to battle with drought send their roots down deep in search of moisture, and when rain does cone, they benefit more by it than those that have regular waterings all along. If the ground is dug deeply, and kept in good heart, plants that have once got established will bear drought for almost any length of time; but things lately planted, and that have not had time to get hold," must be kept supplied, or their beauty may vanish for half the sea son Succulent vegetables, too, which ought to be kept-growing quick, must have abundance, and, of course, plants in pors must, of necessity, have sufficient. There are two important points to be at tended to in giving water; one is to ex pose the water to the sun before using it to render it soft and warm, and the othis to give a thorough soaking at once, sufficient to keep the ground moist wek. Supposing the supply to be limit ed, but regular, the best way of economising both water and time is to take the garden piece by piece, watering each piece thoroughly every evening, and then begining again as at first .- Floral World and Gurden Guide.




