American Republican Convention.

At a meeting of the American Republican Standing Committee of Cumberland county, held at Glass Hotel, in Carlisle, on Saturday the 7th inst., the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the American Republicans of Cumberland county, and all others opposed to the National Administration, are invited to meet at the City of Philadelphia, on Saturday the 28th day of May inst., in the townships between the hours of 2 and 5 P. M., and 9 and 12 P. M., for the purpose of electing delegates to the National Convention, to be held at the Court House, in Carlisle, on Tuesday the 31st day of May, at 10 o'clock A. M., to elect delegates to the State Convention to be held in Harrisburg, on Wednesday the 1st day of June next, to nominate a State ticket to be supported at the next general election.

DELEGATE ELECTION.

We again remind our friends, that Saturday next, is the day appointed by the Standing Committee, for electing delegates to the State Convention. Much depends on the action of the State Convention, in making such nominations as will disarm any attempt at disorganization, and remove all obstacles in the way of a perfect union of the opposition at the fall election; and therefore it is incumbent on the people to send prudent, reliable men, who will act for the good of the party, uninfluenced by personal feeling for one or other of the candidates.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT HARRISBURG.

On Thursday evening last, about 11 o'clock fire was discovered in the barn attached to the State Lunatic Asylum, which was entirely destroyed. The *State Sentinel*, gives the following estimate of the property destroyed:

One large barn, new; cost \$2,000. It contained about sixteen tons of hay, and will be furnished with a new one, at a cost of \$1,000.

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THE WAR IN EUROPE.

Two steamers arrived at New York, on Sunday last, bringing Liverpool dates to the 15th inst. We extract the following from the Philadelphia *North American*:

The reported wreck of the clipper ship *Formosa* proves to be true. She was wrecked off Wexford, Ireland, and 388 lives were lost. She had on board 396 passengers and 62 of the crew, of whom 8 of the former and 17 of the latter were saved. The ship sank in nine fathoms of water.

The war in Europe has commenced. In regard to the war there can be but little doubt that it will be a sharp one. The telegraph line to Switzerland has been cut by the Austrians.

VIENNA, Sunday, May 17.—The Austrians have occupied Jura, Pallanza and Arona, the Swiss having retreated to their approach.

TURIN, Thursday, April 28.—The steamer which arrived at Genoa on the 27th brought a proclamation from the Tuscan army, inviting it to join the Emperor.

A similar proclamation has been addressed to the army in the Romagna.

TURIN, Friday, April 29.—Generals Canrobert and Niel have arrived here, and gone to join the King.

The Austrians are concentrating in great masses at Piacenza, where proclamation has been issued by the Austrian commissioners extraordinary.

Fifteen thousand of the French Imperial Guard have landed at Genoa, making the force now there 40,000 men.

The force at Susa is also increasing fast.

TURIN, Saturday, April 30.—The official bulletin confirms the passage of the Ticino by the Austrians.

Yesterday the King, accompanied by Generals Canrobert and Niel, visited the line of the River Dora.

The corps d'armee which entered Piedmont by Gravelona, consists of twenty battalions and eight batteries of cannon.

TURIN, Sunday, May 1.—The King has gone to assist the council.

The Austrians are at Novara in force, and also at Pavia.

The French infantry and artillery continue to arrive. No decisive movement has yet been made.

BERNE, Saturday, April 30.—The Austrians have seized several Sardinian vessels on Lago Maggiore, and commenced hostilities last evening.

VIENNA, Saturday, April 30.—Count Buol has forwarded circular notes to the foreign ministers, stating the diplomatic and political reasons for the declaration of war by the Emperor.

In England a royal proclamation has been issued offering a bounty of ten pounds to any person who should discover a means of recruiting 10,000 additional men.

The greatest activity prevailed in the English dock yards, preparing for war.

The Emperor Napoleon was expected to join the French army on the 3d inst.

Instructions from the British Admiralty were received at Woolwich, April 28, directing all possible haste in the completion of the new class steam frigates now on the stocks.

A telegram was received at Sheerness on the 27th ult., to send the Royal George to Davenport, the Colossus to Portsmouth, and the Edgar, Queen, and Trafalgar, to be ready for sea immediately.

The Osborne steam yacht, has been ordered to be got ready for immediate service. Its destination is reported to be the Mediterranean, to be placed at the disposal of the Prince of Wales.

CAUSE OF THE WAR.

The cause of the difficulty now existing between Austria, France and Sardinia, in which hostilities have already commenced, has been summed up as follows:

Austria claims that she rightly owns and controls Lombardy and Venice; that she has a right to control them as she sees fit; that in order to do this she must maintain with the several neighboring Italian States such an influence as will render her Lombard-Venetian sovereignty safe. Therefore she keeps up a partial military occupancy of the central Italy, and virtually rules in all Italy.

Sardinia is the only large Italian province which is an exception. There Austria has no power, and the policy of Sardinia, which is favorable to the establishment of constitutional Governments in Italy, is hostile to that of Austria, which tends to the maintenance of the strictest military despotism.

Sardinia and France, sympathizing with her, on the contrary, claim that the Austrian occupation of Italy is injurious in its effects on the Italian States, and is virtually a violation of the treaties and compact of 1815. They demand the abrogation of the Sardinian frontier, and that Austria shall cease to exercise any more control in Italian affairs than the other great Powers. These demands Austria refuses to comply with, alleging that her policy in Italy is necessary to her own protection, and her own dependencies of Venice and Lombardy. These matters have been in controversy for three years. France and Sardinia proposed in 1856 the consideration of this subject by the Congress of the European Powers. Austria would not consent to this. Diplomatic negotiations were carried on, however, between France and Austria, but the difference has grown wider and wider the longer the discussion was continued, until now they propose to settle the whole affair by resort to arms.

THE TIGRO.

The late arrivals from Europe, having brought intelligence that the Austrians have crossed the Ticino, and thus committed an overt act of war on Sardinia, makes this river an important point in the events growing out of this movement.

In Italian, it has the sound of *che*, and therefore Ticino is pronounced as if written *Ticino*. One of our exchanges, speaking of this river says:

Cesar's decisive step was the "crossing of the Rubicon," and the step conceded on all lands be decisive of peace or war, is the Austrian army's crossing the Ticino. This stream is a small river, rising at the foot of Mount St. Gothard, in Switzerland, flowing southward through Lago Maggiore, and finally emptying into the Po near Pavia. During the latter part of its course it forms the boundary line between Lombardy and Piedmont, and hence its importance in a military point of view. It is only crossed and not strongly defended, is remote from the centres of Sardinian population and strength, and hence is naturally chosen as the most feasible entrance for the Austrian troops into Sardinian territory.
