American Republican Convention At a meeting of the American Republican Standing Committee of Cumberland county, held at Glass' Hotel, in Carlisle, on Saturday the 7th inst, the following resolution

was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the American Republicans of Cumberland county, and all others op-posed to the National Administration, are sted to meet at their usual places of holding delegate elections, on Saturday the 28th day of May inst., in the townships be-tween the hours of 2 and 5 P. We again remind our friends, that Saturday next, is the day appointed by the Standing Committee, for electing delegates to the county Convention. Much depends on the action of the State Convention, in making such nominations as will disarm any attempt at disorganization, and remove all obstacles in the way of a perfect union of the opposition at the fall election: and therefore it is incumbent on the people to send prudent, reliable men, who will act for the good of the party, uninfluenced by personal feeling for one or other of the candide tes.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT HARRISBURG.

On Thursday evening last, about 11 o'clock State Luuatic Asylum, which was entirely destroyed. The State Sentinel, gives the fol lowing estimate of the property destroyed:

One large barn, new; cost \$2,000. It.contained about sixteen tons of hay, and all, the farm implements, including a number of costly agricultural machinery, besides harness, the Steward's wagon, a dearborn wagon, and a large farm wagon, all of which were destroyed There were also seven horses in the barn, four of which were burned, six belonging to the Hospital, and the remaining one to Dr. De-Witt, which had only been returned to the Witt, which had only been returned to the barn about an hour previous to the fire.

A large cattle barn about 60 feet opposite

the above barn, was also destroyed. Fortunately, the cattle had all been driven into the pasture field during the day, and with the exception of some chickens and a couple of pige no other animals were destroyed in it.

The roof and attic of the gardener's house, adjoining the above structure at its eastern extremity, were burned to cinder. It can be re-

paired at a trifling expense.

The tenant house, a rough cast building, near to the eastern extremity of the bank barn, was several times on fire, but was preserved by the timely application of water and wet The entire loss by the confingration will fall

a little short of four thousand dollars, on which the State has no insurance While one of the Harrisburg engines was

proceeding to the fire, a fireman named Sam'l J. Miller, stumbled and fell under the engine which passed over him, fracturing the spine. He lingered until the next morning when he expired. The alarm from the above fire had hardly

subsided, when the barn and stable at the Dauphin county Poor House, were found to be enveloped in flames. Owing to the distance from town, the firemen, fatigued by their services at the Asylum, were unable to reach it in time to be of any service. The Sentinel

Whilst examining the ruins this morning, we ascertained that the four splendid mules, considered the best in the county, had perished in the flames, together with five horses, but only one of them belonged to the county. The miller and steward, who have horses of their own, lost valuable animals. One of the horses belonged to Mr. Daniel, one of the Directors, who had left it there while he was on an official visit to New York.

Fourteen valuable milch cows, one large bull and a calf all perished in the flames. The barn contained some 25 tons of hay, 50 bushels of rve and near 40 bushels of putatoe alt of which fell a prey to the devouring ele-ment, together with a number of chickens, ducks, &c. An innocent lamb was running about the ruins this morning as the only an mal that had escaped injury, and seemed to be quite lost. Loss estimated at \$5,000.

An individual, formerly a resident of Carlisle, named Martin H. Wolf; has been arrested on the charge of setting fire to both these buildings.

Those who knew Wolf in Carlisle believed him to be partially insane, and he was a patient in the Asylum for about a year, when he was discharged. Last January, he was arrested at Harrisburg for some disorderly conduct, and remained in jail until last week when the Court made an order to send him to the Poor House, and he was accordingly removed to that institution, but as soon as he was taken out, and before the carriage had actually left that conveyed him there, he was off at full speed, and none seemed to regret his flight. The Sentinel says:

On being questioned Friday morning, he remarked that he had never been in the Poor House before, and that he had made up his mind not to stay there, that he was able to make his own living. His appearance indicates him to be a stout, hearty man, some five feet eight or ten inohes high, well proportioned and perhaps thirty to thirty five years of age. We believed him to be partially insane, yet he conversed very rationally-Friday morning, at the Squire's effice, and acted very shrewd in answering questions put to him in regard in answering questions, put to him in regard

CAUSE OF THE WAR.

The cause of the difficulty now existing between Austria, France and Sardinia, in which hostilities have already commenced, has been summed up as follows:

Austria claims that she rightly owns and controls Lombardy and Venice; that she has order to do this she must maintain with the several neighboring Italian States such an influence as will render her Lombardo-Venitian sovereignty safe. Therefore she keeps up a partial military occupancy of the central Italian States and virtually rules in all Italy. Sardinia is the only large Italian which is an exception. There Austria has no nower, and the policy of Sardinia, which is favorable to the establishment of constitutional Governments in Italy, is hostile to that of Austria, which tends to the maintenance of the strictest military despotism. Sardinia and France, sympathizing with her, on the contrary, claim that the Austrian occupation of Italy is injurious in its effects on the Italian States. prevents the development of that country, and is virtually in violation of the treaties and compacts of 1815. They demand the abandonment of the Austrian occupation of Italy and the Sardinian frontier, and that Austria shall cease to exercise any more control in Italian affairs than the other great Powers. These demands Austria refuses to comply with specimen of the crop.
