HOPES OF PRACE.

By the arrival of the steamship Africa, we have been put in possession of European dates to the 9th inst.

On the 7th inst, the Emperor Napoleon On the 7th inst., the Emperor Napoleon telegraphed to the Empress that an armistice had been agreed upon, and on the 8th it was signed at Willa-Franch by General Hess and Marshal Vaillant. It is to end on the 15th of August. It sciplates that commercial vessels, without distinction of flag, shall be allowed to nexistate the Adriatic unmolested. The Paris Moniteur cautions the public against misunderstanding the armistice, and says that negotiations may recommence, but does not show how the war may be terminadoes not show how the war may be tormina-

ted.

The London Times believes in peace. It says that it is well authenticated that the proposals came from France, indicating a good feeling of moderation, or else the necessity of the French, but does not believe it was the latter. France, however, reups all the transfer of the armistica citter.

the inter. France, however, reaps all the benefit of the armistice either way.

The armistice has caused much excitement; Consols advanced 14@2 per cent. and on the Paris Bourse the advance was 24. The other Continental Bourses all advanced materially. The Austrian funds at Frankfort rose 10 per cent

siege of Peschiera but this and other movements have now lost their interest. In the Federal Diet on the 7th inst., Austria proposed to mobilize the whole Federal contingent and request the Prince Regent of Prussia to assume the command in chief.

"The Monitule of this morning, after having given the official dispatch sent yesterday, by the Emperor to the Empress, adds:
"It is necessary that the public should not misunderstand the extent of the armistice; it is limited merely to a relaxation of hostilities between the belligerent armics, which though leaving the field open for negotiations, does not enable us for the present to foresee how the war may be terminated."

THREATENED JUNE WITH MEXICO. - The New Orleans Picogune says A letter has been written to a citizen of New Orleans which seems to portend a speedy rupture with Mrxico. The letter was written on the 3d inst , at Minntitlun, Tehunntepec, where the U. Sminister, Mr. McLane was then paying a visit to the U. S. consul, Mr. Allen, and conveys the intelligence that our minister had failed to come to any proper and freditable arrangement with the Juarez government, as he had failed to obtain just satisfaction from that of Miramon; that he felt nneasy in his position, and considered any further attempt at a peaceful solution of the Mexican question uscless; that in this sense he had plainly written home to his government, as also he had notified the government of Juarez that if they did not come at once to an understanding with the United States, a resort must be had to arms; and finally, to sum up all, that as no proper response was expected, war between the two countries was inévitable.

VOLUNTEERS FOR MIXICO. - It is said that a roject has been 'started, to raise two Regiments of Volunteers in Pennsylvania, who are to offer their services to the Liberal party in Mexico.
