Kitchen Economy.

IN MAKING CAKES, PIES, PASTES, AND IN COOKING FRY. There are a thousand ways by means of which a good wife can learn to be economical and save, where she certainly could not be called extravagant if she did not save.

Let the good housekeeper try her numerous receipts, and cut short the allowance of butter and sugar in some kinds, and use it not often just as readily. Molasses can be used instead of sugar, by being boiled and set away for that purpose.

When baked, this crust will be white, fluffy, and will break when cut through very short, and a nice looking crust is thus made, taking but little lard, thus being both economical and healthy.

By thus learning to use molasses, instead of sugar, where it will do just as well, and lard where butter is generally used, saving a little here and a little there, the good wife, almost unknown to herself, will find her larder fuller at the end of a twelve-month, and her pocket well pleased with the result.

Family Receipts. A lady in the Germantown Telegraph says she has copied some of the following receipts from other journals, and some are of her own household, and all have been found excellent.

TO MAKE INDIAN QUEEN CAKE.—One cup milk, one cup short, one cup corn meal, one cup of shorts, one cup potatoes, (mashed through a fine wire sieve), one cup white flour, one cup white sugar, half a nutmeg, half of one lemon peel (grated fine.) Pour in a buttered tin; bake half an hour in a hot oven; cover over with crushed sugar. Eat hot for tea.

BROWN BUTTER.—Take one and a half teaspoonful sugar, four teaspoonfuls butter-milk, two teaspoonfuls salt, two eggs, a little salt, and flour enough to form a dough. Beat the eggs light and mix them with the milk, then add the sugar, and knead well. Roll out into one-half inch thick, cut into little round cakes about an inch in diameter, put them into a pan of hot lard, and then take them out when a crust brown color.

GRIST CAKE.—One cup fat of fowls, two cups white flour, one cup shorts, one cup sugar, one egg, one cup brown sugar, one cup mashed potatoes, half an ounce ground corn seed, six drops cinnamon, one teaspoonful soda, ten drops salt. Mix well; bake in buttered tins in a hot oven, half an hour; baste the top with the yolk of an egg, laid with white sugar.

LEMON PRES.—Beat with the yolk of four eggs, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, four of white sugar, the juice and grated rind of two lemons.—Put into a froth, adding two tablespoonfuls of grated sugar. Spread on the pies when done, put them in the oven and bake again for three minutes. This is for two pies.

TEA FLIPS.—Two cups of corn meal, one cup of flour, one cup of oat meal, one cup of fowls, two cups milk, one teaspoonful of soda, half a spoonful of salt, half a spoonful of ground cake seed, one (apple or lemon or very nice). Mix (tea light foam) bake on a griddle; eat hot with honey or maple molasses.
