The Cranberry.

The general demand for the fruit of the Cranberry, in our large cities, and its value both for preserves and pastry, ren ders its profitable cultivation a question of interest with many. An indigenous plant even now abundantly scattered over the Northern States, it is not subject to those drawbacks which attend the productions of Gooseherries, Currants and similar small truits of exotic origin. The peculiar habit and character of the plant, however, renders it less easily turned to profitable account as a common garden or farm product As formerly known, the Cranberry, of which there were two species common in our low swampy grounds or ephagnum swamps, was collected and sold as an incidental product of uncultivated districts. Eventually cultivation was brought to bear on its peculiar characteristics until yielding to artificial culture, it was produced on dry and more elevated grounds, and finally became a special crop propagated and transplanted as we transplant Strawberries, or other small fruits. With the supply, the demand increased, and in the New England states it has now become a valuable crop, when treated with skill and attention.

The wild Cranberry is of two species:

The common (Oxycocus palustris) for-merly Vaccinum, is found in New Jersey, New York and northward, in sphagnum swamps, and the large fruited (O Macro carpo) less common and superior as a fruit. Cultivators claim to have at least increased the size of the fruit and growth of the plant:

The name, Bell Cranberry, is applied to a reputed variety, which succeeds on upland or dry soils also called the Up]

iety most cultivated; and hundreds of barrels are annually sent to New York market, where they command six to twelve dollars per barrel.

The product of an acre varies greatly. With extra culture- it may reach three hundred bushels.

Cultivation. The most suitable soil for the Cranberry, is a sandy loam with a fair proportion of decayed vegetable mattea. For the lowland varieties, swamps reclaimed by the levelling of the surface and removal of water, which can be readily done by ditch draining and the exposure of the soil to the action of the atmosphere, supplying sand where deficient in quantity; is the most obvious course. Owing to the fine fibrous nature of the roots, it is important that there should be fy sufficient sand to render the soil close in its texture yet not of a tenacious character. The weight of the sand has this __ effect.

nting. The plants which are obtained from cuttings furnished with roots are set out in shallow drills or ruts, eighteen or twenty inches apart; the plants about six inches apart in the drill. Sufficient soil must be drawn to the plants to bind them. The plants should, to be successful, be so spread as to cover the sur-To secure this result in favorable soil will require three or four seasons.

Gathering the Crop. This is done by means of a rake with wire teeth through which the branches of the plants pass, pulling off the fruit. And here is proba-bly the most objectionable part of the routine. The rake must injure the plants considerably; but hand picking would not prove profitable. It is estimated that one man can gather about thirty bushels per day with this rake.

There has been much attention recently given to the propagation of Cranberry plants for sale to planters. They cost a bout five dollars per thousand put up in a safe manner for transportation.

Planting may be done either in full or spring. In some localities, fall would prove the most suitable, and in others supply the wants of the agricultural community, nature of the soil and climate, the state of the land to be planted, and the facilities for procuring the plants. We should prefer spring in this part of the country as plants could be readily obtained here in April, and the soil prepared. In more northern latitudes, the early appearance of frost would interfere with the prepa tion of soil, and planting early in spring; so that fall would, under such circumstances, prove the most suitable season. The success of a Cranberry plantation, like any other fruit culture, will depend

on the skill and care devoted to it. The difficulty of keeping the culture free from weeds will prove one of the most formidable drawbacks. The crop, when it covers the ground, will not admit of the ordinary method of destroying coarse grasses (nut grass) so commonly found in such soils. Should any of our correspondents desire to add any hints on the cultivation of the Cranberry, we shall please to give them publicity. Specimens were brought to our office raised by William Bates, Cape May County, New Jersey, which measured three and one quarter inches in circumference. The Farmer and Gard-

TOTALE HENS LAY IN WINTER. To be sure of a good supply of eggs in Winter, raise some chickens as early in the spring as possible. The pullets of these early broods will be large enough to lay late in the fall, and if they are supplied with warm quarters, besides being well fed with grain, and allowed, occasionally, a few scraps of fresh meat thrown in to them, they will continue to lay all winter. Old hens if treated thus, will often become quite prolific.—Hen roosts should be supplied with ashes, gravel, and pounded shells, especially in winter, when the hens cannot procure these ar
