Agricultural Department.

PLANT PEAS DEEP. The theory recently advocated of plant ing peas very deeply in the earth, in orde to prolong the bearing capacity of the vines, has also been well tested in Wil liamstown, and found to be correct. A farmer told me that he ploughed a farrow beam deep; then scattered the seed pear at the bottom; after which he turned a deep furrow upon them with his plough, covering them, if possible, to the depth of twelve inches. They pushed their way up through the thick mass of earth very soon, and instead of turning yellow at the bottom and dying after the first gathering, they bloomed and bore until he was tired of picking the pods . If such a result will uniformly be realized from the plan, peaculture may be made more profitable than

STARTING SEEDS EARLY. . Rev. Daniel Emerson, Summit county Ohio, states that he has been successful in giving garden seeds an early start in the following manner:—Having selected the quantity needed, each sort is tied up by itself in a cloth, the name being written on a slip of paper, and enclosed with the seed. The packages are then buried about two inches deep in the ground for a week or two-When ready to plant, the kinds needed for planting are taken from the bags and used. They will be found to have swollen, perhaps spronted, and ready to-grow. If the ground should be quite dry, it is best to water the drills after dropping the seed, and then cover with dry earth. Mr. E. says that by this plan he has never failed to raise plants from every seed planted. It each seed is placed where it is wanted to grow, it will save the labor of thinning, though many prefer to thin then rows, leaving the most prominent plants to grow-

PLANTING TOMATOES. A correspondent of the Gardeners' Chronicle (ling.) strongly recommends the growing of tomatoes wholly in pots, especially by those who raise only a limited supply of a dozen or two plants for home use. He also thinks market gardeners, and those living in cities, would find this mode invaluable. The pot-plants are entirely under, control, and require almost no attention. He says: "I have not planted out tountoes for the last five years, but have had instead good crops from plants in pots, with no trouble in training, or stopping, and no failure as to production or ripening. I sow the seed in a No. 60 pot at the end of February. The plants are kept starving under olar till the middle of April, then shifted into thumbs, and put on the potting-bench for a week. They are then packed together under a warm fence, and when they want it, are shifted into 60's and allowed ro get quite pot-bound."

THE PEACH CROP.

For the coming year is most likely to be an entire failure. The buds, so far as we learn from the papers and private sources, have been generally killed, by the extreme cold. The extensive peach orchard of our friend and excellent farmer, Mr. George Longstreth, four, miles east of town, and which had such an abundant poach harvest last year, will, as he informs us, bear none this year. The buds are mostly, if not all killed, and he fears, in some cases, his trees also are dead -- Let our readers, who were so fortunate as to get peaches last year, be economical in their use, for they will get none the present year. We trust the apples, which are the main fruit crop, will be safe — Lebanon (O) Star.

TO KEEP INSECTS FROM PLUM

It is recommended, as a remedy for the ravages of the curculio, to grow plum trees with the branches over a stream of water. The curculio do not sting those plums which would fall in the water if separated from the limb. It is claimed by some that the cunning insect is aware of the fact that the plum would fall in the water, and therefore their eggs, if deposited in it would

THE TRIMMING OF GRAPE VINES. During April we had many letter asking "Is it too late now to trim grape vines?" Grape vines should never be trimmed i in the spring; November is the better time. At that date they will not blede and by freeing the vine from its uselesportions, you prevent the exhaustion of the roots by constant evaporation from the tranches, and consequent ascent by ea-billary attraction; the wind blowing among the branches also assist this action. Com pare a ving trimmed in November, with one along side of it trimmed in spring, of equal size, and invariably the November rimming will give the best results.

Locust Year .- Anno Domini 1860. according to entomologists, is locust year The red eyed cleada, a member of the Hemiptera or half-winged order of insects, has proved itself in its visit to New-York State, so much like the genuine oriental name of locust. A peculiarity of its natural bistory is that the usual length of time which it requires for completing its growth and the perfect regularity with which every generation, numbering many millions of individuals, attains maturity, cause the infliction of its presence unfaling at the end of every seventeen years .- The last appe rance of his greedy insectship it is said was in 1843, so if there is any he is said was in 1920, so in there is any faith to be put in croaking entomological prophots, we are in for it again, this year of grace. So that in the steady onward march of civilization, it sceme even the seventeen year locust must fall into line and there is room for hope that in time he will cease his ill-mannered invasions altogether. 🔀
