PLANTING SHRUBBERY .- Too little at tention, it seems to us, is given to this feature of ornamental planting. Our rura improvers generally persist in setting out coarse timber trees, in rows like an or chard, all over their grounds, and finish ing off their work by putting lilac or rosebushes around the door-way. Well this is better than nothing. But an improvement can be unde on this, as the Mollow-

ing lants may show a 🤲 Let the forest trees - except on large places - be few in number, and confined mostly to the bound tries of one's premises: The trees near the house should be of smaller size, and such as have smooth trunks and branches. A few shrubs may be set near the dwelling. If the premises are small, like most village lots, single specimens of large shrubs may be set on the lawn and trained up as miniature trees. This will give the place an appearance of larger extent than though it had been set with forest trees. Shrubs may also be planted in groups and masses, arranging them according to their respective heights. They may also be used as screens to hide disagreeable objects, or to conceal one part of the grounds from the other. They appear very well, also, when used to enircle a flower garden; the central beds being occupied with plants, and the boundaries set with shrubs, the lowest in front and the highest in the rear.

As belts to conceal from the house the outer fences of one's grounds, they are also useful. The pleasure walks may be led in front of these belts, and so afford a pleasant view of them all through the ason. If they are set here, instead of being crowded in front of the house, the lawn appears larger, and every way bester. A good assortment of shrubs will afford

one a variety of flowers nearly all Summer, and that with far less trouble than any other class of plants. We will here men tion a few of the desirable sorts to plant Azaleas, in variety; Pyrus japonica; Ro binia: Spirma: Deutzia: Euonymus: Hi biscus; Hydrangea; Philadelphus; Syr inga; Laburnum; Weigelia, ect. A shrubbery is a permanent affair, one of the "institutions" of a country-place, and should therefore be made well at the out set, and afterwards taken care of. Those well proved and fast friends afford us in the long run, the greatest satisfaction .-American Agriculturist.

'SET OUT A FEW MORE FRUIT TREES, RTC -Yes, set out a cherry tree by the the gate near the road, and another at the end of the house to partially shade the sitting room from the hot sun The cherry, when well trained, forms a regular, symmetrical tree, ornamental at least when covered with a profusion of snow white bloom, or bending beneath its load of dark red fruit. Set a pear tree in the nook by the shed, and one at each end o the carriage-house. They will injure noth ing, and the rich soil will cause them to grow rapidly. Now put out a few peach trees along the garden border where the shade will scarcely injure the vegetables; or a few trees may be set compactly-15 feet apart, and the space they would shade be used for raspberries and blackberries.

There is the lane, too, leading to the pasture, which might well have a row of apple or pear trees upon each side, which will injure the adjacent fields far less than the returns they should give. The road side, also, can be set with apple trees yielding winter fruit. Such single rows of trees usually give better return than the same number of trees in an orchard Again, there is the south side of the barn, shed and hovel, yes, and the tight fence upon the north side of the garden, which might be covered with grape vines and yield many bushels of fruit.

Now, reader, look about your buildings, around the yard, along the fences, etc., and see if there is not room for a few more trees. Then go to the nearest nurseryman, if he is an honest, careful grower, and select your trees, have them taken up with all the roots, take them home without exposure to the sun, and set at once in large broad holes, spreading out the roots and fibers in their natural pos tion. If the soil is not rich, add a slittle old manure or ground bones at the time of setting, and hopefully await the result of your expenditures in time and money. -American Agriculturiit.

A VALUABLE MANURE.—No manure is so well worth saving in October and November as the falling leaves of the season. According to Payne, they contain nearly three times as much nitrogen as ordinary barn yard manure; and every gardener who has strewn and covered them in his trenches late in the fall or in December, must have noticed the next season how black and moist the soil is that ad heres to the thrifty young beets he pulls. No vegetable substance yields its woody fibre and becomes soluble quicker than leaves, and from this very cause they are soon dried up, scattered to the winds and wasted, if not gathered and trenched in, or composted, before the advent of severe

winter. White turnips, including the yellow stone Aberdeen and others, which, though yellow, are of the same nature, will safely endure but a moderate frost. The first effect of the frost is to sweeten them,and render them more mild and pleasant for the table. The same cause induces then to sprout more readily, and to become corky or pithy at an early period. For table use they should be harvested early before severe frosts, the crowns or topcut off closely, and stowed in barrels o open bins in a dark cool cellar. A temperature below thirty degrees in the field or cellar will injure them, and any growth they may make in the field after this degree of cold, seems to be of little value. -Homestead.

FARM YARDS .- A correspondent suggests the following plan of constructing farm-yards: "First make the yard level (large or small;) then commence in the middle and scoop out in the form of an apothecary's scale, deepest in the middle, to the depth of one foot in the deepes place. Then collect straw, leaves, old hay, bog grass, sawdust, or anything that can be made into manure, fill it up level with a row of mangers around the outside: then have living water in the yard; and when you commence foddering, shut the bars or gate and keep every creature in the yard when not in the stable; then fill up with litter to give them a good bed, and keep doing so until spring, and the manure is three feet deep or more if pos-sible. Then dispose of it as best you can. Some let it remain until Fall, and use it for top-dressing; others cart out in Spring, and commence filling up again to keep the weeds from growing.
