The Concord is a rampant grower, very hardy, though not apt to bear well until it attains the age of five or six years when it becomes productive enough, but never suf-fers from overbearing like the Isabella. Persons who have no time or are un willing to take the trouble to prune their vines, should by all means procure the Concord. It will bear the coldest weather that we have in New York, uninjured without shelter or protection, and will thrive and produce fruit of fair quality when planted in the poorest soil. foliage is large, broad and thick, and the berries never mildew or rot, but when

dead ripe they sometimes drop from the cluster. Qur Massachusetts friends say

that it is "four weeks earlier than the

Isabella, and that it is fully ripe from the 3d to the 10th of September." Now, I will not say that such is not the case in Massachusetts, but I will say, that with me, it is only about one week carlier than the Isabella, and not what I call fully ripe till the latter part of September, when it will be found quite melting and far richer in the saccharine principles than the Imbella, but has much more of the for fragrance. A few pounds of the fruit when ripe, will, in a few days, perfume a large room. Some persons are very fond of this foxy odor, and to others it is very Last fall(1859) I hal quite a offensive fine lot of these grapes, which sold in market the same as good Isabellas. THE STRAWBERRY.

. Mr. R. G. Pardee, of New York, in a lecture at Yale College, on the strawberry,

The following, to cultivate that fruit, is the best method: - Select a warm, moist, but exposed situation; for early berries let it slope to the east or south: for late ones to the north. The soil should be a fine gravelled loam. Avoid high, barren soils and those which are wet: To prepare the soil. make it clean; underdrain, leaving the drain open at both ends, to allow the circulation of air. Pulverized at least two feet in depth, making ten per cent. of the soil as fine as superfine flour. For manure, apply thirty bushels of lime slacked with water, holding three bushels of

salt in solution to the acre. Transplanting should be done with care, and the rootlets at the plant injured as little as possible. The best time to transplant is in the spring, though, with care, it may be done any time during the summer. The lecturer said he would, in starting a new bed, place the plants three feet apart. Water may be added with great advantage, in large quantities, except during the flowering and ripening periods, provided always, it does not stand and become stagnant on the soil. The hoe should never be used about the plants as it injures the roots. The productive ness of the strawberry about New York does not average more than forty bushels to the acre. There is no diffiraising one hundred and fifty bushels under the cultivation recommended. In the winter the plants should be lightly cov-

THE DEPTH OF TREES

There has recently sprung up some controversy as to the proper depth that trees should be transplanted, and as is usual in controversies of this kind among practical men, there is not the least hope of their ever coming to a common opinion on the question. And this is natural and perhaps as it should be. Different kinds of culture, beginning with the planting. For instance, dwarf pears should be planted deep, two or three inches below the union of the quince with the pear, in all soils where a dwarf pear ought to be. A fir or spruce should be planted shallow, and so, as a rule, should standard pear as well as apple trees. This exception should however be made: in light, porous, soils they may be guaged deeper than in clay Thus the heavier the soils the shallower should the trees be planted. Such is our experience.

EGG-PLANTS

In roply to a subscriber in Solebury, Bucks county, as to the proper time of setting out egg-plants, the Germantown Telegraph says they should not be transplanted before the 28th of May. Usually the first week in June is the safest period

They are exceedingly sensitive to cold and a single frost will retard their growth from one to two weeks. When such nights occur place over the plants any thing to protect them-boxes, pots, or old newspapers. Egg plants, as well as to-niato plants, should be transplanted in the hot-bed, say from six to eight inches apart, to secure strong, well-bushed plants.

Grapes From Cuttings.

I send you the following remarks on the propagation of grape vines from cuttings, which may be done with very little troub le: - Have a box two feet high, and about two and a half wide;— the length as you require,—fill half full of well-pulverized soil; prepare the cuttings with three eyes -cut smooth below the bottom one ; place them in a slanting position, with the last bud just above the soil; take six-penny white cotton cloth, and nail tightly over the box; give warm soft water freely, every evening; place the box in a sunny nook, and in a few weeks your bex will be filled with grape vines, ready for potting or planting in borders .- Correspondence of the Albany Cultivator.
