were demolished, the persons were saved.

Ill., two miles north of Camancho, with full force, destroying every building in the town, although but five lives were lost, thirty-five were seriously wounded, some mortally and-10 persona missing. The citizens of Clinton and Lyons received the news of the storm at 74 o'clock, P. M., when Mr Milo Smith, Superintendent of the C. Land N. R. R., immediately sent a train loaded and N. R. The steamer Queen City, Capt. Bristol. was also loaded with people from Clinton and Lyons and sent to the scene of disaster, and all possible assistance rendered.—Houses and stores were stripped of their contents by the wind, and the citizens are left with barely the clethes they had on their persons at the time. To day frains have been run from Clinton to Camanche every hour, and through the aid of efficient committees much relief has been ren-dered. The call of the committee for donations has been very heartily responded to, but when we consider the number that are left desolate, we must confess we have fears of great suffering.
