The intelligence which reaches us in regard to the growing crops is generally of a cheering character. The late rains have been of incalculable advantage throughout the North and West. In Illi nois and Wisconsin the farmers, anticipate a harvest far exceeding in bounty that of any previous year. In Kansas there is any previous year. In Kansas there is yet complaint of drought. In Minnesota wheat and corn never promised better. In Iowa the rye harvest will be ripe as early as June. The Detroit (Mich.) Advertiser notices some very fine specimens of the province of t of both wheat and rye. Several other papers speak of the wheat crop as looking remarkably well. In Kentucky, short crops are predicted. The accounts from Pennsylvania lead to the anticipation of of an unusually large grain and fruit crop. The grain fields are luxuriant, and whea will mature early. The papers from all sections of Maryland speak favorably of the appearance of the growing grain From Virginia we have some accounts of damage to the grain but even there an average crop is expected.

THE FRUIT CROP.

The Gernantown Telegraph says "The season has reached the point, when we may predict, with tolerable certainty, the fruit crop for the year. We have examined a number of apple, pear and peach orchards, and have come to this conclusion: That the apple crop will be a fair one, the blossoms having suffered comparatively little from the late frosts, the heavy rains, and the severe blows. That the pear crop will not be more than half a yield, owing to these reasons. That peaches will be pretty abundant in old orchards, while in the young orchards there will be almost a total failure. The Reybold orchards of Delaware, we learn, promise a full crop. That there will be an abundance of characteristics. promise a full crop. That there will be an abundance of cherries, while the straw-berry beds afford undoubted evidence of a bountiful yield. Altogether, we regard the fruit indications as highly promising, not even excepting the peach, which has in various journals been proclaimed to be utterly destroyed. Strawberries in the height of the season, will sell at six cents a quart!

Speaking of the Farming and Fruit Prospects in New York, the Rochester Union says :-- "It is not saying too much to assert that the prospects of the farmers and fruit growers of this vicinity were never better than at present. This may be said, without any exception, we believe, in reference to any important branch of agriculture. If there ever was a time when farmers should suspend their labors for a day, to return especial thanks to Providence for His favors, that time has arrived. But it is not here alone that our farmers are thus favored; from all sec-tions of this State we hear like favorable reports of the crops. The Syracuse Journal states that the prospects of the agri-culturists in the centre of the State were never better than now."

Cattle Murrain.

This disease has been destroying vast numbers of Cattle in the State of Massachusetts, and to such an extent, had its ravages extended, that the Legislature of that State appropriated \$50,000 in paying for the diseased Cattle, which have been slain, in the hope of preventing the spread of the disease. But the appropria-tion has been expended, and the disease still prevails to a fearful extent. The matter has been deemed of sufficient importance by the Governor to justify him in convening an extra session of the Legislature, to adopt measures for the preven-tion of the further spread of the disease. It is said to be spreading rapidly into Connecticut and Rhode Island

It is just like the cholera, and has already started on its winding way, to spread desolation amongst the herds of the Union, and unless it is summarily stopped, (provided that is possible,) we may look forward to sore times before the present year is out.

It has broken out in new localities, far

distant from where it first appeared, carried thither doubtless by the transportation of diseased animals. Indeed, the disease is now firmly fixed in twenty of the largest cattle-raising districts in New England. And yet, in the face of dauger threatened by the spread of this plague, butchers are found in the infected districts buying up diseased cattle cheap for the New York market!

A FERTILIZER FOR STRAWBERRIES.—
An experiment mide in 1859, may not be amiss at this time for the growers of strawberries.
