THE CAUSES OF ILL HEALTH-IMPROPRIETY OF EATING.

When riding on a locomotive last week and talking with the engineer, as I had the privilege of doing, I could not but think how much wiser men were about iron and steel machines, than they were about fleshy and osseous machines. The relation of the pump to the capacity of the boiler: the relation of the furnace to the size of the flues; the relation of the cylinder, or of the steam generated, to the work to be done-all these things were in the engineer's mind. He was contin uously watching every part and opening and shutting valves on every side, so as to keep every part in its proper condition. The stoker or fireman was applying or withholding food, so as to keep the en-gine in just that state in which it would work best, according to whether we were running on an up-grade or a down-grade, or on level ground, and according to the number and weight of the cars being drawn for we had been drawing a long

and ponderous train. Now how many are there who watch their lurnace, to see that they get in neither too much nor too little fuel? Men shovel food without any regard to what it is going to do! If it is the Sabbath day, when they have less air and exercise than any other days, and when their stomachs are not in a condition to digest as much food as on other days, they eat a double portion. If it is a day when they are to undergo severe taxation and work and when they can least afford to go without food, oftentimes they become anxious and neglect to cat because the body needs the basis of food less than at any other time, they eat the most, and when it needs it more than any other time, they eat the least. Our food is a means to an end. It is simply the fuel with which we are to raise steam for carrying on the purposes of life. A man should eat as much on principle as he prays.

I have been asked, sometimes, how I could perform so large an amount of work with apparently so little diminution of strength I attribute my power of en-durance to a long formed habit of observing, every day of my life, the simple laws of cating. It has become a second nature to me. It ceases any longer to be a mat-ter of self-denial. It is almost like an instinct. If I had a severe tax on my brain in the morning, I can not eat hard ly at breakfast. If the whole day is to be one of nervous exertion, I eat very little till the exertion is over. I know that two forces cannot be concentrated in activity at the same time in one body. I know that when the stomach works the brain must rest, and that when the brain works the stomach must rest.

If I am going to be moving about out of doors a good deal' then I can give a fuller swing to my appetite-which is never exceedingly bad. But if I am en gaged actively and successively in mental nbor, I cannot eat too much. And I have made eating with regularity, and with reference with what I have to do, a habit so long, that it ceases any longer to be a subject of thought. It almost takes care of itself. I attribute much of my ability to endure work to good habits of eating, and constant attention to the laws of sleep, physical exercise and general

cheerfulness. There is one thing more to be said in this connection. It is not a matter of epicureanism that a man should be dainty concerning the food he eats. On the contrary I hold that a civilized man ought to be civilized in his cookery. I suppose one of the signs of the millenium w a better regulated kitchen-a kitchen that sends out food that will not make Christian men sick! Henry Ward Beech-

HOEING.

There is no work that requires to be done more thoroughly and yet speedily than hocing. The rapid growth of weeds and grass among crops is one of the incidents of the climate, about which there are as many advantages as disadvantages. If the warm weather promotes the growth of weeds, it also helps along the crop full The only difficulty occurs from the fact that the soil may be so foul with the seeds of weeds, and they having been sown so long previously that they are ready to sprout before the seed of the potato or the corn has a chance to compete with them in getting above ground. This is particularly the case with the small seeds. which seldom get headway as quick as the weeds, even though steeping and other expedients may be resorted to for the er expedients may be resorted to for the purpose of giving them a start. In no work is the old familiar adage of "stitch in time saves nine" more applicable than during the season of hoeing. If possible, the cultivator ought to be nun through as early as possible after the young plant shows itself. A cultivator for this kind of work should be light and narrow, so that there is no fear of it injuring the rows of plants, and made so, that it will rows of plants, and made so that it will stir the ground, whilst tearing up the weeds. A corn cultivator should be made specially for that one crop, and if to be used on light ground, it should be different even from that which is to be used upon a stiff soil. As soon as the corn cultivator does its work, the hoe should be made to do its work well. The hills should be cleaned out thoroughly and freed from every particle of grass or other weeds, the ground well loosened around each stock of corn, and then work again with the cultivator. This kind of work pays, because it is done in time, and the crop gets the whole benefit of it during the growing season.—Michigan Farmer

COWS CANNOT HOLD, BACK THEIR MILK .- Dr. Dodd, in the American Stock Journal, says a cow cannot exercise any control over her lacteal organs, and gives this as the reason :- "The museular tissues which compose the parts direct. ly in the region of the lacteal duct, or milk channel, are involuntary muscles. Were it not so, any cow might, by voluntary relaxation of the muscles which guard the outlet of the mammary gland, evacuate at any time her own milk, and thus defraud her owner."

SLABBERING IN HORSES. -- A correspondent of the Boston Cultivator says this is a disease in horses. Saltpetre—a table. spoonful for a dose—he has found to cure the worst case he ever had, and has not found it necessary ever to give the fourth dose. He gives a table-spoonful in the morning, and in three days, if he is not free from it repeat the dose.
